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Alec Hepburn: From small town to International glory

In the rugged world of international rugby, stories often unfold that encapsulate the essence of the sports determination, spirit, and cultural heritage. Such is the story of Alec Hepburn whose journey has taken him from humble beginnings at the local Southerners Sporting club in Hopetoun to the grand stage of international rugby, representing Scotland, the country of his late father's birth.

Rugby Union was a sport that Hepburn didn't play until the age of 14 when he moved to England with his brother George to complete High School. Their father George had moved back to England after living in Australia and it presented a great opportunity to complete School and College. Here Alec gave up his beloved basketball to learn rugby at Gillotts school in Henley on Thames, a county rich in rugby spirit.

Alec later attended Henley College where he studied and continued to play Rugby. Alec, always a very strong boy, opting to play in the front row. Here he had much success. He began his rugby journey in the local London Wasps academy. During this time, he was selected in the England U18s before joining the then-championship side London Welsh. Today, Alec has spent the better part of a decade at Exeter Chiefs where he has now played 174 games in the premiership. Alec was involved in two premierships in 2020 in the Champions cup tournaments and the Gallagher premiership.

Alec's international career began back in 2018 when he was selected for England international honours through residency under Eddie Jones in the Six Nations Tournament. Later that year he had his first international start in the Quilter International tournament. In total, Alec earnt six caps for England.

Having not played internationally since 2018 Alec has completed the 3-year stand down period (introduced in 2022) to switch allegiances to the nation of his father's birth, Scotland.

Alec made his debut Saturday February 3rd at Principality stadium in Wales in front of a crowd of 75,000 people. Scotland went on to win the game 27-26. This was the first time Scotland had beaten Wales in Cardiff in 22 years. Hepburn will travel to Scotland to play France on February





10th. His first home game will be at Murrayfield Stadium where his philanthropist great uncle Charles paid for the installation of the underground heating at the stadium. This was the first of its kind at the time.

We are so proud of Alec representing his Scottish heritage and wish him the best of luck with the remainder of the six nations tournament.

Word of the Day

quirk noun | KWERK

Definition:

Quirk refers to an unusual habit or way of behaving. It can also refer to something strange that happens by chance, as in "a quirk of fate."

Did You Know?

Those whose quirk is to zig while others zag (and conversely those who zag while others zig) will appreciate the origins of today's word. Not its etymological origins, mind you—no one knows whence quirk came—but the twists and turns of its meanings across the centuries. The oldest known use of quirk dates to the mid-1500s, and referred to a clever verbal dodge of the kind one might use to turn the tables on someone in an argument or debate. It didn't take long for quirk's meaning to expand to cover all kinds of twisty, turn-y things, from witty retorts and curlicue flourishes made with ink on paper to the vagaries or twists of fate. The sense of quirk meaning "a peculiarity of action or behavior" refers to a twist of sorts as well, insofar as our quirks often flip others' expectations of us, perhaps even causing them to quirk their eyebrows now and again. In a surprising twist, quirk began to be used as a verb meaning "to curve or twist" in the late 1800s.

As a young national serviceman in the Royal Marines, John was at the Montebello Islands during the first Atom test carried out by the British.

John migrated to Western Australia within the year and has been a resident of WA since 1953.

Malleefowl DNA Research team is asking for you all to help!

■ Fitzgerald Biosphere Community Collective

The National Malleefowl Recovery Group (NMRG), in partnership with Australian research geneticists, plan to undertake important DNA analysis to further understand our cryptic malleefowl bird, and they are appealing to YOU to help them!

Over the next few weeks, the NMRG would like to obtain as much genetic material (malleefowl feathers and dead carcasses) as possible to enable this DNA research. This could be any field OR citizen scientists who come across or monitor malleefowl.

The NMRG request any and all field-collected malleefowl feathers, these can be posted to the address below (or made available for pick-up within 100km of Perth).

Feather samples would need:

- to be in individual envelopes/bags
- date collected
- GPS (or equivalent) location details recorded
- Your name and contact email

Its important to try and keep these collections crosscontamination free if it can be helped.

Additionally, the NMRG are seeking any and all frozen malleefowl bird carcasses collected from the field or road-side fatalities to be made available to this new DNA research. If you know of recent bird fatalities or have stored frozen bird samples please get in contact with Dr Liz.

Creating Biosphere habitats tick the boxes for conservation

■ Fitzgerald Biosphere Community Collective

During the 2024 Hopetoun Summer Festival the FBCC was grateful to be apart of Hopetoun CRC's Animal Habitat Workshops, held over 2 days during January School holidays.

Habitat boxes play a crucial role in supporting wildlife conservation efforts, particularly in regions like Southwest Australia where biodiversity is rich but habitats are increasingly threatened.

They can come in many shapes and sizes and use a variety of materials. We focused on insects, amphibians, birds and mammals. Different behaviours of these critters determine different designs.

First and foremost, the preparation for this event began weeks before. Karrina Smallman, manager of Hopetoun CRC, mustered up plumbing pipe from Beecroft Plumbing and Gas, purchased solar lights, sphagnum moss, safety gloves and glasses, sourced donated timber and Jarrah offcuts. The day of, she enlists the servitude of the Smallman family members to fill the trailer with gravel from her home as we treasure hunt for banksia pods, paperback and pine needles - culminating in the stock of supplies for 30 attendees to rummage through and create a masterpiece for our local critters to shelter and nest.

Al, a local handyman volunteer, sets up a workshop by proxy out the front of the Hopetoun Youth and Art Space as we begin with a tabletop introduction from Nathan McQuoid, local Landscape Ecologist, former Fitzy Parks' Ranger and Chair of the FBCC. Combining his knowledge and expertise from his carpentry, ecology profession and experience within the region, he gives us insight as to what he has tried and tested over decades for native fauna, particularly in the Fitzgerald Biosphere.

Nathan brought in examples of natural hollows we are trying to imitate and emphasized the importance of giving thought to what might occur in various areas, correct placement of habitat boxes, monitoring these safely and most importantly, encouraging the sharing of our findings and asking lots of





questions.

It's events like these that bring us all together in a shared mission to nurture and protect our local environment. The event was inspiring, creative, educational and above all, hands-on and fun!

We also want to express our thanks to Al Higgins, who contributed his time and energy to ensure the smooth running, teaching, cutting, sawing and mentoring our future habitat box builders.

On behalf of the FBCC and Hopetoun CRC, big thanks to all of the attendees, whose enthusiasm and engagement made the workshop a vibrant and enriching experience, helping to protect and preserve the ecological balance aligns well with OUR Fitzgerald Biosphere aims. It was heartwarming to see all ages from the community come together with a shared sense of curiosity, united in our mission to create homes – open for 'all hours'- for critters big, small, winged or furred.

Dog Act 1976 Local Government Act 1995

Amendment to Dogs Local Law 2010

The Shire of Ravensthorpe has resolved to adopt the Shire of Ravensthorpe Dogs Local Law 2010 with Amendment March 2022.

The purpose of this local law is to make provisions about the impounding of dogs; to control the number of dogs that can be kept on a premises and the manner of keeping those dogs; to prescribe areas in which dogs are prohibited and dog exercise areas.

The effect of this local law is to extend the controls over dogs which exist under the Dog Act 1976.

A copy of the local law may be inspected at each Shire office between 9:00am and 4:00pm Monday to Friday, or viewed on the Shire of Ravensthorpe website.

This local law was gazetted on 7 February 2024 and will come into operation on 21 February 2024.

Malcolm French presenting Eucalypts '24 at Twertup for Friends' AGM March 9th 2024

Eucalypt expert, Malcolm
French will be the guest
speaker at our AGM. Malcolm
has been interested in
eucalypts since the 1980s
when he grew them for
his family farm in New
South Wales. In 1993 he
moved to Perth to work as
an agriculturalist and had
the opportunity to travel
extensively around Western
Australia, stopping regularly
to check out any eucalypts.

The more he saw and researched them, the more his passion for eucalypts grew.

Malcolm's first book The Special Eucalypts of Perth and the South-west was published in 1997. Subsequently he published Eucalypts of Western Australia's Wheatbelt (2013) and more recently co-authored with Dean Nicolle Eucalypts of Western Australia: The South-west Coast and Ranges (2019). These books provide comprehensive information on individual eucalypt species and have been designed and written for both professionals and those with no botanical training.

At the Perth Herbarium,
Malcolm is an Associate
researcher and honorary
curator of the genus
Eucalyptus. Many botanists
have benefited from
Malcolm's knowledge which
he generously shares. In
2015, Malcolm was awarded



Updated guide helps reduce risk of pre-emergent herbicide carryover

- Pre-emergent herbicides have the potential to persist in the soil for longer than desired if conditions do not favour breakdown.
- For herbicides that are inherently slow to break down, dry summer conditions may see the herbicide carryover well into the next crop.
- Growers are urged to review their previous season's herbicide selection and consider the number of weeks during spring and summer where the top 0-10cm of soil was moist, as this is the only time when a residual herbicide would have been degrading.
- For all herbicides refer to the label or other information provided by the manufacturer for specific advice.

Pre-emergent residual herbicides are an important weed management tool in Australian cropping systems, as they can be used to control weeds that compete vigorously with growing crops for water and nutrients, as well as weed species that are difficult to control using post-emergent herbicides in-crop.

Western region growers have a wide range of pre-emergent herbicides at their disposal and many have the potential to persist in the soil for longer than desired if conditions do not favour breakdown. Safe and effective use of these products requires a sound understanding of their chemical characteristics and the factors that could lead to herbicide carryover causing losses in subsequent crops.

Herbicide persistence factors

The amount of time a residual herbicide persists in the soil at effective levels can be highly variable. The starting dosage in the soil is a key factor. For some herbicides, pre-incorporation losses can occur due to chemical volatility, degradation via sunlight, the incorporation method used, binding to stubble or direct absorption into green leaf material if weeds are present.

Once in the soil, the way a herbicide interacts with moisture, temperature, soil pH and organic matter can affect its persistence.

However, for almost all herbicides, soil microbes are the primary pathway for chemical breakdown. Abundant soil microbe populations require a food source of organic matter, along with warmth and moisture. As a result, microbe populations are usually highest near the soil surface.

If the top ten centimetres of the soil dries out, as often happens over summer, microbe numbers will fall and very little herbicide breakdown will occur until the soil is wet again. For herbicides that are inherently slow to break down, dry summer conditions may see the herbicide carryover well into the next crop.

Managing the risks in Western Australia

In many areas of the WA grain belt, organic carbon content is relatively low which, when combined with limited rainfall and long periods of dry soils, increases the risk of herbicide carryover. Growers are strongly urged to review their previous season's herbicide selection and consider the number of weeks during spring and summer where the top 0-10cm of soil was moist, as this is the only time when a residual herbicide would have been degrading. Extra caution is recommended on soils with an organic carbon less than 0.5% and/or a cation exchange capacity of less than 2.

Use product knowledge to anticipate herbicide carryover

While the persistence of all pre-emergent herbicides needs to be managed carefully, some products deserve particular attention:

Herbicides with high soil mobility, such as Group 2 Sulfonylureas (SUs) and Imidazolines (IMIs), as well as Group 4 Pyridines, may move deeper in the soil profile with rainfall after application, especially on lighter soils. When herbicide moves below the area of greatest microbial activity degradation rates can be extremely slow, resulting in extended carryover at depth.

In addition, Imidazolines tend to have greater soil persistence on acidic soils, while several of the Sulfonylureas persist longer on alkaline soils.

Of the more recently introduced products, Bixlozone (Group 13, Overwatch®) and Fomesafen (Group 14, Reflex®) have demonstrated extended persistence under conditions unfavourable for breakdown. Both of these herbicides are slow to degrade in the soil, and growers need to ensure there have been extended periods of moisture in the topsoil over the warmer months, before planting sensitive crops into previously treated paddocks.

For all herbicides refer to the label or other information provided by the manufacturer for specific advice.

To help promote awareness of these issues, GRDC has worked with Independent Consultants Australia Network (ICAN) to update the grower and adviser reference manual Soil behaviour of pre-emergent herbicides in Australian farming systems.

The updated publication and its companion guide Understanding post-emergent herbicide weed control in Australian farming systems are both available via the GRDC website. (See Useful resources below.)

Maximising the value of pre-emergent herbicides

- Pre-emergent herbicides can be a very useful part of an integrated weed management strategy, with benefits that include:
- Alternate modes of action to many postemergent herbicides, which helps to delay resistance and minimise the impact where it has occurred.
- Reduced early competition from weeds, providing subsequent benefits for yield.
- Potential to pre-emptively control weed patches, especially where previous weed outbreaks have been GPS-logged to allow for targeted application.
- Useful control of weed species where there are limited in-crop control options.
- Using the GRDC's updated guide to understand the properties and risks associated with different pre-emergent chemistries will help growers make more effective herbicide investments and minimise carry-over risk to crops.

It is also important to remember that preemergent herbicides are only one of the tools needed for a year-round integrated weed management strategy. They have negligible impact on the weed seed bank and need to be integrated with tactics such as in-season spraying and harvest weed seed control (HWSC) to minimise weed seedbank and herbicide resistance risks in a profitable cropping system.
