

FIREWORKS AND PETS

Get ready for an exciting fireworks display at theFishing Classic! But let's not forget about our furry friends who might not share the same enthusiasm for the fireworks as we do!

Fireworks can be quite distressing for animals, so here are some simple steps to minimize their stress and keep them safe:

• Ensure your pets are wearing ID tags and their microchip details are up to date. This way, if they get scared and run off, they can find their way back to you.

• Take a recent picture of your pet, just in case they decide to pull a Houdini and try to escape. We all know how sneaky they can be!

• Before the fireworks start, make sure your pets are wellexercised and have a full tummy. This can help them feel more relaxed and less anxious.

• Keep your animals indoors in a safe, secure, and comfortable environment. Create a cozy den for them to retreat to when the booms and bangs begin.

• If you have horses, securely stable them away from the firework noises. They deserve a stress-free night too!

• Leave the TV or radio on to mask the sounds of the fireworks. Maybe your pets will enjoy a little dance party of their own!

• If your pets are prone to fireworks or storm panic, stay at home with them, remain calm, and carry on with your normal activities. They look up to us for guidance, so let's show them that everything is okay.

• Engage your pets in their usual activities like playing and reward them for their calm behavior. Treats and their favourite toys can work wonders!

• If you need additional help or your pet consistently struggles with anxiety during fireworks or other loud events, don't hesitate to make an appointment with one of our veterinarians. We can provide additional advice and recommend anxiety-relief medications if necessary. There are treatment options available for managing noise phobias, and we can discuss any new treatments or consider using a Thundershirt (an anxiety shirt) for your furry friend. Your pet's well-being is our priority!

Let's enjoy the fireworks responsibly and take precautions to protect our pets and wildlife. Together, we can make sure everyone has a safe and enjoyable evening!

A retinue is a group of helpers, supporters, or followers.

Did You Know?

Retinue comes via Middle English from the Anglo-French verb retenir, meaning "to retain or keep in one's pay or service." Another retenir descendant is retainer, which has among its meanings "one who serves a person of high position or rank." In the 14th century, such retainers typically served a noble or royal of some kind, and retinue referred to a collection of retainers—that is, the noble's servants and companions. Nowadays, the word retinue is often used with a bit of exaggeration to refer to the assistants, guards, publicists, and other people who accompany a high-profile individual in public. You might also hear such a collection of folks called a suite or entourage, two other words that come from French.

2024 Federal Budget should fund GP research for better health

The Royal Australian College of GPs (RACGP) is calling on the Federal Government to invest in general practice-based research to improve the evidence base for GPs caring for patients and helping people live healthier.

Australia's largest peak GP body, the RACGP is calling for funding and support to establish a national practice-based research network in its pre-Budget submission 2024-25.

GPs are strongly in support of the measure which would improve patient care. A nationwide newsGP poll found the greatest benefits of a national practice-based research network would be:

• stronger evidence for clinical decisions 68%

• More career opportunities for GPs within general practice 13%

• better information to provide patients 11%

RACGP President Dr Nicole Higgins said: "Funding homegrown health research carried out in the place where most people access healthcare will improve the health and wellbeing of Australians. It's simple.

"We know that practice-based health research networks are immensely valuable. The Canadian network produces strong evidence that results in better care for the health issues the country is grappling with, including chronic disease, ageing, addiction and even allergies.

"And when the pandemic struck, the United Kingdom used its network to rapidly establish a large-scale trial of COVID



treatment in general practice.

"The pandemic exposed a gap in Australia's health system; a major underinvestment in general practice-based research. We don't have a national network like the UK or Canada, so we couldn't run large-scale trials of COVID treatment in general practice.

"If we had a national network in Australia, we would be much better prepared for the next pandemic, have much needed data on GP consultations, and GPs would be better equipped with solid evidence to tackle the health challenges of today and the future.

"We do have smaller practice-based research networks in Australia that show the value of homegrown research, such as the Translating Research Outcomes in the Primary Health Interface (TROPHI) project, in outer eastern Melbourne.

"This innovative project is focused on improving care in line with local community needs - developing better tools and support for people with mental health concerns, is just one example. It is a collaboration between the RACGP, the University of Melbourne and Monash University, with seed funding from the Windermere Foundation.

"I urge the government to make this investment in the next Budget - it will pay dividends in terms of improving our health and wellbeing for generations to come."



Softly, Wotan said.


"Will you read to us when we are older?"

Inspect retained canola seed for damage

GRDC

Growers retaining canola seed for sowing next year are being strongly encouraged to check for whitening of the seed shell as a result of pod damage caused by blackleg infection.

While the disease damage is not expected to spread through the seed stock during storage, it may reduce emergence rates of infected seed or result in early infection of canola seedlings after sowing.


Affected grain should still be safe for cattle feed and may still be usable for sowing with an appropriate fungicide seed treatment.

To further mitigate risk, careful attention should be paid to grain storage conditions. Low humidity and temperature is essential for maintaining grain condition in silos and will help minimise any disease development.

Regular aeration is required with temperature and moisture monitors to store grain under optimal conditions.

How to assess and manage damaged seed

To assess canola seed, separate a random sample of 100 grains then visually inspect each one for signs of whitening. Separate and count the damaged grains



FOR ALL ON FARM DELIVERIES OF FUEL to calculate the rate of damage as a percentage of the total stock. (For example, 20 damaged grains from a sample of 100 is a rate of 20 per cent.)

Grain receivers will generally accept some level of seed damage. Growers should consult with their receival centre or grain marketer about acceptable damage rates for a delivery.

Growers who plan to sow retained canola seed with whitening damage next season should consult their agronomist or adviser about applying an appropriate fungicide seed treatment prior to sowing or, ideally, obtaining clean seed instead.

GRDC is investing in glasshouse trials to quantify the effects of seed whitening on emergence rates and blackleg susceptibility and provide guidance for pretreating seed. This advice will be published as it becomes available.

Timing drives crown cankers and upper canopy infection.

Blackleg of canola is caused by the fungal pathogen Leptosphaeria maculans. It can cause significant yield losses, especially if it is not managed in the early (emergence to flowering) stages of growth.

This early infection causes cankers in the crown of the plant, which restrict water and nutrient transport from the roots and, in severe cases, can cause the plant to collapse.

Blackleg spores can continue to infect the plant after flowering but will manifest as upper canopy infection (UCI) rather than crown cankers, causing lesions on the stems, leaves, pods and seeds.

UCI risks increase with early sowing

As with most fungal diseases, blackleg is favoured by

wet conditions and disease pressure is generally higher in wet, cool months and in medium and high-rainfall zones.

The risk of blackleg UCI is increased by early sowing, where the crop reaches the flowering stage while elevated levels of atmospheric moisture help support fungal spread.

Early sown canola that flowers during late July and early August is at particularly high risk of UCI and yield losses of up to 20 per cent can result from infection of the stems, flowers and seed pods.

However, the likelihood of yield losses from UCI drops rapidly in crops that flower after mid-August.

Fungicides usually provide effective control, but the pathogen is noted for its rapid ability to evolve resistant strains. Careful choice of cultivars that provide effective genetic resistance to blackleg under local conditions is therefore strongly recommended.

Optimum sowing time for canola is influenced by

several factors. Growers are encouraged to consider local and seasonal conditions when evaluating risks and making decisions on canola time of sowing.

Manage blackleg agronomically and proactively

Blackleg management requires constant care by canola growers. The pathogen survives on canola stubble until it has been fully broken down. As a result, canola should not be planted into a previous season's stubble and should ideally be sown at least 500 metres from the previous year's canola paddocks.

With appropriate rotations, cultivar choice is generally the best option for managing crown cankers, while time of sowing is the best defence against blackleg UCI.

Growers and advisers are urged to use the available blackleg management tools to minimise their blackleg risk from year to year and to assess the economic merit of in-season management decisions, especially around fungicide use.

Grains projects get off the ground for research collaboration

Two new grains projects are underway for the WA Agricultural Research Collaboration (WAARC) aimed at converting research insights into farming resilience, profitability and sustainability for the state's growers.

The five-year Lupin Disease Resistance and four-year Harvestable Annual Legume Options (HALO) projects are the first to be announced under the collaboration's Grains Transformation program.

Grains Transformation is one of six key program themes developed by the collaboration, which also include Northern Agriculture, Climate Resilience, Agricultural Technologies, Aboriginal Participation, and Capacity Building and Extension.

Lupin Disease Resistance is focused on boosting lupin resistance to its four major diseases, while the HALO project is exploring harvestable annual pasture legume cultivars that can be used in rotation to reduce synthetic nitrogen fertilisers.

Both grains projects are a co-investment between GRDC and the collaboration (including its seven partners – Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD), CSIRO, Grower Group Alliance, Curtin University, Edith Cowan University, Murdoch University and the University of Western Australia).

WA Agricultural Research Collaboration director Dr Kelly Pearce says the new projects bring together funding partners and multidisciplinary collaborators for the advancement of agricultural R&D in WA.

"It is wonderful to see these grains projects get off the ground and to mark another collaboration milestone since our first Northern Agriculture project was announced in May - the Cropping Enabled Cattle initiative," Dr Pearce says.

GRDC managing director Nigel Hart says that through the collaboration, the best researchers and research institutions are working together to develop innovative solutions to the big issues facing agriculture.

"By working together, we can harness our combined might to apply innovative, cutting-edge science to address some of WA's unique challenges and opportunities," Mr Hart says.

"These two new GRDC-invested projects, exploring lupin disease resistance and annual pasture legume options, will deliver additional rotation options for WA growers, contributing to the profitability of farming systems."

The Lupin Disease Resistance project brings together the crop genetics and plant pathology expertise of DPIRD and Curtin and Murdoch universities, with the plant breeding experience of Australian Grain Technologies.

DPIRD genetic improvement portfolio manager Darshan Sharma says the project will help deliver future narrowleafed lupin varieties with improved resistance to its major diseases: Phomopsis, cucumber mosaic virus, anthracnose and Sclerotinia.

"We will share the outputs from this exciting project with

pre-breeders and breeders to ensure future varieties require less disease management, maintain yield stability and deliver better outcomes for WA growers and farming systems," Dr Sharma says.

The HALO project brings together the pasture legume breeding, agronomy and bio-economic modelling expertise of Murdoch University, DPIRD and CSIRO.

DPIRD and Murdoch University principal research scientist Ron Yates says incorporating legumes into crop rotations could reduce risk in the farming system by cutting fertiliser costs and allowing for better management of weeds, pests and diseases with positive flow-on effects for the environment.

"Our research team has hit the ground running – gathering and evaluating harvestable annual legumes that are suitable to grow productively throughout the WA agro-ecological zones," Dr Yates says.

The collaboration will continue designing and developing projects that maximise the impact and reach of current agricultural research, fund research gaps, attract more research dollars into WA, build capacity and leverage the state's collective research talent.

BAITING TO PROTECT

NATIVE WILDLIFE

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's *Western Shield* program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.



Highlights at the Salmon Gums update include weed and herbicide resistance management strategies and managing soil variability, as well as a new technology panel where growers will share their experiences with Swarm Bot, variable rate technology and other new technology for grain growing enterprises.

In Lake Grace, a panel session will look at soil engineeringwhich machine for which job - featuring Garren Knell, ConsultAg, and Gaus Azam, DPIRD, as well as a panel of growers to discuss local trials and experiences with different soil amelioration equipment.

At Mukinbudin, key focus areas include nitrogen management and marketing for grain, as well as a session from Ben White, Kondinin Group, on future innovations for farm machinery to improve productivity and sustainability of grain growing.

Mukinbudin's panel session will feature Chris O'Callaghan from the Liebe Group with a panel of growers discussing strip and disc experiences.

To round out the series, the Darkan update on March 21 will feature lessons from the High Yielding Crops project in the high rainfall zone, precision agriculture in rocky and hilly country and a panel of growers facilitated by Andrew Ritchie, Icon Agriculture, reflecting on lessons from 2023 for cropping programs and farming systems in 2024 and anything new planned to be trialled.

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
