#### Word of the Day

genuflect verb | JEN-yuh-flekt

#### Definition:

To genuflect is to kneel, or nearly kneel, on one knee and then rise again in worship or as an act of respect. In figurative use, genuflect means "to be humbly obedient or respectful."

#### Did You Know?

Today we give reverence to genuflect, which comes from the Late Latin word genuflectere, formed from the noun genu ("knee") and the verb flectere ("to bend"). Flectere appears in the etymologies of a number of more common verbs, such as reflect ("to bend or throw back light") and deflect ("to turn aside"). By comparison genu has seen little use in English, but it did give us geniculate, a word used in scientific contexts to mean "bent abruptly at an angle like a bent knee." Despite the resemblance, words such as genius and genuine are not related to genuflect; instead, they are related (genius directly, and genuine indirectly) to the Latin verb gignere, meaning "to beget."

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# Exceptional battery test results show Springdale concentrate is ideal for premium Li-ion battery anode

- Purification testwork on micronised and spheroidised Springdale concentrates exceeds the purity requirements of major lithium-ion (Li-lon) batteries.
- The optimised processing conditions using a chemical non-hydrofluoric acid (HF) method achieved results ranging from 99.96% LOI to 99.97% LOI.
- Electrochemical tests were conducted on an uncoated purified sample of Springdale graphite concentrate which showed exceptional battery charging and discharging capacity.

International Graphite Limited (ASX: IG6) is pleased to report exceptional results from purification and electrochemical testwork on graphite concentrates generated from the Company's 100% owned Springdale Graphite Project, in Western Australia (Springdale).

The graphite concentrate micronising, spheroidising and purification test program was conducted in Germany by industry specialists ProGraphite GmbH (ProGraphite). The electrochemical test work was also conducted in Germany, under ProGraphite's supervision, by a specialist graphite battery testing group.

The graphite concentrate tested came from reserve samples produced from previous beneficiation testwork using drill core samples from Springdale1

. Purification testwork involved the application of a modified caustic soda roast process at lower temperature than previously applied and with a simplified number of stages.

Optimised tests achieved results ranging from 99.96% Loss On Ignition (LOI) to 99.97% LOI, thereby exceeding the industry standard purity grade of 99.95% and also meeting all the element-specific requirements of major Li-lon battery and electric vehicle manufacturers (refer to Table 1). There is considerable scope to further optimise these results.

Electrochemical testwork on the uncoated purified sample of Springdale graphite concentrate achieved near theoretical-specific capacity for a graphite anode in Li-ion batteries of 372 mAh/q.

Battery stress testing over 46 charging / discharging cycles showed Springdale graphite concentrate has very high stability and durability, with the 46th cycle giving a reversible capacity of 368 mAh/g. Stress testing over longer cycles will be conducted in the next stage of battery testwork.

International Graphite Technical Director David Pass said, "The purification results demonstrate the potential for an optimised and simplified purification process to be used as an alternative to the traditional industry standard HF method.

"The electrochemical results are highly encouraging as a first phase sighter test program. These results will inform the optimisation of micronisation, spheroidisation and purification testwork and flowsheet development for our

planned battery anode facilities.

To do that, we will be using ~115kg of Springdale graphite concentrate that was produced by the bulk concentrate testwork program undertaken in the second half of 2023."

#### **COUNCIL ENDORSES 2024 BUSHFIRE MITIGATION TREATMENTS**



At the Ordinary Council Meeting on Tuesday 19 March 2024 Council endorsed the 2024 bushfire mitigation treatments as proposed and funded under the Mitigation Activity Fund Grants Program.

This work is extremely important for our Shire and while we understand that bushfire mitigation is often an emotive issue, these proposed mitigation treatments are taking place on a very small amount of land.

Out of 860,000 hectares of bush, less than 200 hectares is included in these plans, which is less than 0.1% of land across our whole Shire that needs to be mitigated.

#### TREATMENT TYPES

The Shire of Ravensthorpe uses a number of methods to mitigate the risk of bushfire in the region.

Mitigation activities outlined in the proposed plan endorsed by Council include chemical and mechanical (example pictured above) treatments, as well as reducing fuel loads and hazard reduction burns to minimise the potential risk of fires.

Full details of all of the proposed mitigation work for the year (including the location and which treatment is to be used) can be found on the Shire of Ravensthorpe website, and will be promoted in various ways in the coming months.

It should be noted these are *proposed* works for 2024 and are subject to weather conditions.





#### PLANNED BURNS







By endorsing this proposed mitigation work, Council is also endorsing the use of planned hazard reduction burns as a treatment.

This means planned burns are due to take place in several locations throughout the Shire of Ravensthorpe in 2024, including the following examples:

#### Ravensthorpe

A follow up burn is planned near the Ravensthorpe Hospital (Pictured, top left) to clean up debris in the undergrowth since the last burn in 2022. This will ensure the reserve is in a low fuel state with reduced flame length in the event of a bushfire.

Machinery will go in first to prepare the site before the burn.

#### **Hopetoun**

A planned burn is proposed for the road reserve and vegetation at One Mile on the eastern outskirts of Hopetoun (Pictured, middle left) to reduce the fuel loads and reinforce the strategic buffer.

#### **Blue Vista**

Another proposed treatment is a planned burn to manage fuel loads in the road reserve on the eastern side of the Hopetoun Ravensthorpe Road (Pictured, bottom left) adjacent to the Blue Vista subdivision.

As mentioned on the previous page, these burns are all proposed works and are subject to weather.

More details about the mitigation work can be found on the Shire of Ravensthorpe website. Maps of proposed burns will also be on display at the upcoming Hopetoun markets.

# Posties dodging more than 200 hazards a day

Australia Post's latest safety data has revealed over 81,000 hazards were logged by Posties in the past 12 months - a staggering average of more than 200 per day.

The data, tracked and logged by Posties on their handheld devices, shows that dogs remain the number one logged hazard encountered, with low hanging branches and obstructive trees also posing a high safety risk.

Some of the more unusual hazards that Posties have to contend with include magpie and other bird attacks, insect nests in letterboxes and roped off driveways.

Across the country, NSW had the highest number of logged hazards throughout the year at over 20,000, followed by Victoria with nearly 19,000 logged hazards.

In the other states and territories South Australia logged over 13,000 hazards, Western Australia had over 10,000, Tasmania logged 1,300 the ACT logged over 900 and the Northern Territory logged over 500 hazards.

The top five logged hazards encountered by Posties across the country in the last 12 months include:

- 1. Unrestrained or aggressive dogs
- 2. Low hanging branches, obstructive trees/shrubs

- 3. Surface conditions such as cracked footpaths and uneven surfaces
- 4. Letterbox conditions including sharp, jagged or rusted edges
- 5. Blind driveways and obstructive cars

Australia Post rolled out the digital hazard tool 12 months ago in a bid to help reduce incidents and injury to Posties.

Provided to every Postie, the hazard tool enables them to easily, immediately and digitally log a hazard when they come across it.

The next time they, or any other Postie, approach a prelogged location they will receive a warning notification on their device, allowing them to avoid it or take extra care.

Rod Barnes, Australia Post Executive General Manager Network Operations highlighted that Posties just want to be able to complete their deliveries safely, without hitting their heads on low-hanging branches, navigating badly cracked footpaths or having to avoid aggressive dogs.

"The nature of the job requires our Posties to be out and about every day so anything we can do to help keep our team safe and reduce risk is important. This national hazard database allows us to track hazards consistently and accurately, ultimately reducing the risk for our team members.

"Once a hazard is logged in the system we take the necessary steps to try and resolve it for our team.

"This might include engaging local council for issues such as badly cracked pavements or writing to the customer to fix the issue in the case of unrestrained dogs.

"The safety of our team is our number one priority and if they cannot do their job safely then we may be unable to deliver until the hazard is fixed," said Mr Barnes.

In addition to the hazard tool Australia Post also uses telematics, including video footage and sensors, across its delivery fleet to help to reduce serious accidents as its delivery team takes to the streets each day.



# New SPAA manual brings grower insight to precision ag

#### GRDC

Australian grain growers will benefit from new insights into precision agriculture (PA) for the grains industry with the release of the PA in Practice III manual.

The publication was launched by Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) Western Panel chair Darrin Lee today (February 26) at the Grains Research Update in Perth.

Produced by the Society of Precision Agriculture Australia (SPAA) with GRDC investment, the manual is part of the project precision fertiliser decisions in a tight economic climate.

Mr Lee says Australian growers were eager to implement PA into their farming practices, and for many the goal was limiting per hectare fertiliser usage while maintaining crop yields.

"Through our National Grower Network (NGN) and grower feedback mechanisms, GRDC has identified grower demand for education and extension to optimise the outcomes of PA adoption," Mr Lee says.

"Growers want to know the questions they should be asking suppliers, agronomists, and consultants. They want to be aware of potential challenges and have the chance to listen to other growers' success stories and advice."

Mr Lee says a 2021 grower survey by SPAA and GRDC indicated that more than 50% of respondents wanted to use precision agriculture to make planting and fertilising decisions based on more data.


"Through the updated PA in Practice manual, growers have access to over 100 pages of content detailing PA throughout the season: pre-sowing, sowing, in-crop and at harvest. In addition, comprehensive case studies facilitate peer-to-peer learning and make the information easy to digest for growers."

SPAA Executive Offer Angelique McAvoy says the manual catered to all grain producers, agronomists or advisers regardless of their knowledge of PA.

"PA in Practice has been designed as a comprehensive foundational manual that clarifies definitions and provides step-by-step guides to applying PA such as remote sensing imagery, interpreting yield data, developing strip trials, or what to consider when choosing a new PA platform," Ms McAvoy says.

"Complementing each chapter are 18 case studies from grain growers across Australia, providing relatable and regional perspectives. The generosity of all those who have contributed their knowledge and thought leadership to produce the content of PA in Practice III is greatly commended."

Ms McAvoy acknowledged the publication's author Alisa Bryce for her pivotal role in simplifying technical content and creating a valuable resource for a broad agricultural

audience.

"PA in Practice will remain a vital SPAA educational resource that will be integrated into webinars and other learning platforms. It will play a key role in bridging knowledge gaps and addressing barriers to the adoption of PA," Ms McAvoy says.

The manual's release complements a national series of seven SPAA variable rate technology workshops supported by GRDC investment and delivered in 2023, which provided training to support growers' fertiliser decision making, particularly with rising input costs.t

# Growing global population placing increasing demand on water

Water, a finite resource, is under growing pressure from growing populations at both national and global levels, says Sustainable Population Australia (SPA).

According to SPA, this threatens both social and international stability.

SPA national president Jenny Goldie says currently about half the world's population experiences severe water scarcity for at least one month of the year due to climatic and other factors.

"If you have a finite or diminishing resource such as water but an evergrowing population that is dependent on it, then there is less of that resource for each person," says Ms Goldie. "The blame for decreasing water security is too readily sheeted home to climate change when, in fact, still-expanding populations may be more responsible.

"For instance, across the Sahel in Africa, as a result of rapid population growth, conflict, extremism, climate change and

poverty, 150 million Sahelians are facing immense challenges in terms of access to water. The region's population will double in the next twenty years.

"Here in Australia, water security became a major concern in the late 20th and early 21st centuries as a result of population growth and recurring severe droughts exacerbated by climate change. Overextraction from our river systems has led to environmental degradation. Now, each Australian mainland capital city relies on desalinated water to meet needs during dry periods and in Perth, continuously.

"A UNSW study from 2022 found that much of the river flow decline on the Darling River has not been because of climate change but almost certainly as a result of increased water extractions.

"But why has so much water been extracted? Because of the competing interests of grazing, irrigation and urban water supplies along its length. Too many people are demanding too much of the river."

According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) in its sixth Report (AR6), over large parts of the world, crop losses due to droughts are projected to be at least twice as likely at 1.5°C global warming, 150 to 200% more likely at 2°C warming, and over 200% at 4°C.

"Water and food security are integrally linked," says Ms Goldie. "Extreme droughts mean less food. Yet the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) says the demand for food is projected to increase by 60 per cent by 2050.

"It's not going to happen. Unless we divert a lot of production from livestock fodder to feeding humans, many people will starve. The sooner we can stabilise population numbers, the fewer the numbers of people who will suffer and die."

# GRDC leads \$42M initiative to bolster biosecurity for Australia's grain grower

A groundbreaking \$42.7 million national biosecurity initiative led by the Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) in partnership with five state government departments is set to transform the effectiveness and responsiveness of Australia's grains biosecurity system.

Announced by GRDC Chair and grain grower John Woods at the Grains Research Updates in Perth today (February 26), the National Grains Diagnostic and Surveillance Initiative (NGDSI) is a co-investment between GRDC and the WA Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD), the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI), the Victorian Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA), the New South Wales Department of Primary Industries (NSW DPI), and the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (QDAF).

The six-year initiative will use state-ofthe-art technology and processes to improve Australia's ability to rapidly detect and accurately diagnose exotic pests and plant diseases - allowing identification to happen 'near the paddock' rather than in centralised laboratories.

It will also support the development of more than 20 biosecurity specialists across Australia, modernise current surveillance techniques and utilise global intelligence to forecast future pest and disease risks to the nation's grains industry.

"This initiative is one of the most important investments GRDC will make on behalf of Australian grain growers and is the result of two years of collaborative work with our partners. It is powerful in the sense it has brought together the nation's primary grain growing states in a united effort to reduce the very real risk that exotic pests and diseases pose to agriculture," Mr Woods says.

"Timeliness of detection and response are critical and can be the difference between cost-effective control or the devastation of an industry. We need to equip growers - and other key people - with the tools for fast, accurate diagnostics to enable timely management decisions that reduce the

impact of these threats to the grains industry."

Mr Woods says the industry faced increased biosecurity risks from a range of factors including more frequent international movement in trade and people, increasing chemical resistance, a decrease in the number of technical specialists and increasing input costs.

"This important national initiative will link with new and established pest surveillance for faster detection, which will allow more responsive eradication or management plans to be put in place," Mr Woods says.

"Critically, it will also ensure we have national diagnostic protocols - or specific pest and disease guidelines for accurate identification - in place. Currently there are 54 exotic pests or diseases considered a high risk for the Australian grains industry, yet less than 10 per cent have national diagnostic protocols, which means accurately identifying them could take weeks."

The initiative will also invest in developing more than 20 specialist technicians, scientists and PhD students across the five states.

At an international level the NGDSI will utilise the intelligence networks of the Federal Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) and the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) to develop pest and disease risk analysis for each of the grains high priority plant pests (HPPP), the national priority plant pests (NPPP) and 10 emerging pest risks.

"We will use the most sophisticated technology available to forecast the risks and predict the arrival and impact of exotic pests and diseases. For example, we will leverage the United Kingdom's Earth Observation for Agroclimate investment looking at wheat blast in Bangladesh to determine the transborder risk to Australia," Mr Woods says.

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
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
