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Cr Rachel Livingston resigns

On Thursday March 28th, 2024 Councillor Rachel Livingston resigned from her position on Council due to the increased travel required after moving away from the community.

"When I first signed up to be a councillor we were living in Ravensthorpe, my daughter was in the school, my parents were seniors in the town and it was prior to our wonderful but surprise pregnancy," Ms Livingston said.

"I now feel the position of councillor will be more deserving for someone who can contribute more time and energy than I can and who lives in the community every day. I'm honoured to have served on this Council with a wonderful group of councillors and I still hold the community dear to me."

Shire President Tom Major thanked Ms Livingston for her two and a half years of service on Council.

"Rachel was elected in 2021 and has brought a lot of value to the team since then and we'll miss her considered contributions," Cr Major said.

"Her decision to move on is disappointing but understandable and we wish her all the best in her future endeavours."

As set out in the Local Government Act 1995, an Extraordinary Election is necessary to fill the vacancy left by Ms Livingston's resignation.

At the Ordinary Council Meeting on Tuesday 16 April 2024, Council agreed to engage the Western Australian Electoral Commission to manage the Extraordinary Election.

It is likely to take place in July, but the date will be confirmed

2024 FUNDING: NEW GRANT APPLICATION PROCESS

There are several key changes to the grant application process for 2024. Some of the changes include:

- No requirement to first submit an Expression of Interest
- Widened eligibility to any ABN holders operating in the Shire of Ravensthorpe
- Tiered grant amounts depending on the number of partners involved in the application
- New Grant Application Guidelines 2024 and Grant Application Form 2024

As well as meeting the updated eligibility criteria outlined in the Grant Application Guidelines 2024, the success of an application will be based on its alignment with the identified behaviours of a proactive community:

From BirdLife we want to honour John Tucker, a long-term BirdLife member and volunteer who passed away recently. John was a bushman to the core and was happiest when he was out there observing nature, whether it was insects, mammals, birds, lizards or plants.

As a long-term BirdLife volunteer he was involved in many projects including shorebird surveys, Hooded Plover surveys, Carnaby's breeding monitoring, the Great Cocky Count and many Cape Arid Western Ground Parrot expeditions.

He was also involved with the planning and construction of the bird hide and the bird list for Culham Inlet in Hopetoun. He had a prodigious knowledge of Carnaby's Black-Cockatoo and was instrumental in the campaign to protect their habitat in the Ravensthorpe - Hopetoun - Cocanarup area.

BirdLife Western Australia would join up with him and the other members of the Cocanarup Conservation Alliance each year to conduct black cockatoo breeding monitoring in Cocanarup, and were always impressed with his knowledge of the area and his passion for Carnaby's Black-Cockatoo.

His extensive knowledge, skills and commitment will be sorely missed, and we extend our condolences to his family and friends.

During Science week in 2023, the UWA Walking Together project team and The Fitzgerald Biosphere Community Collective (FBCC) collaborated on an event entitled 'Living and Learning the Biosphere'.

The event was a great opportunity to showcase this collaborative project, parts of which are currently underway in the Fitzgerald Biosphere, exploring how we can work together across cultures to restore culturally

informed conservation practices aligning well with UNESCO's Man and Biosphere programme.

The Walking Together project are now working on another fantastic event

- The Kwodjet Goorliny Symposium: Movingforward together to care for Country - and is open to everyone who is interested in reconciliation, caring for Country, and moving forward into a more just and sustainable future.

It will bring together crosscultural conservation collaborations from all over Australia, mark the culmination of the Walking Together project, and places strong emphasis on prioritising and listening to Aboriginal voices.

The Walking Together project is a four-year collaborative research project led by UWA Albany Professor Stephen Hopper in partnership with southwest Australian Aboriginal peoples and South Coast NRM, and funded by Lotterywest.

It brings Traditional Owners and UWA researchers together to explore the ecological effects of Noongar caring for Country practices, with the ultimate goal of achieving more inclusive conservation management approaches in southwestern Australia.

By integrating Noongar traditional ecological knowledge into land management practices, the project seeks to benefit Aboriginal wellbeing, national reconciliation, and address biodiversity decline.

Scheduled from May 14th to May 16th, 2024, at the Retravision Stadium in Albany, WA, this symposium will be an incredible opportunity to explore the transformative process of walking together to care for Country, for professionals and interested individuals alike.

That night was their last night together. They sat in a circle on the floor talking about the fun times they had had. Snooky had smuggled some meat from his plate at dinnertime.


It was not touched.

South Coast Marine Parks Update

Ask for 200m setbacks in your submission

There is nothing quite like standing on a south coast beach, rod in hand, facing the salt spray as the water laps at your feet. Dreams of mulloway, salmon, big tailor and skippy, or maybe a snapper often become a reality on many of the pristine beaches between Bremer Bay and the SA border. Many of these beaches are things of folklore in recreational fishing networks, having been at the centre of many fishing milestones for generations of fishers.

Fishing from the beach along the south coast is part of our culture. It is accessible to those without a boat, provides the remote wilderness experiences, and due to the unique geography of granite headlands and beaches with varying aspects, can often scratch a fishing itch at times when weather conditions prevent going out to sea in a boat. Even the most avid boat fisher will usually have a surf rod or two in their fishing arsenal.

In all our conversations with local fishers, it has come through loud and clear that shore-based fishing at these prized locations - including Poison Creek, Warrenup, Twilight Cove, and areas around Cape Le Grand - must not be impacted by the marine parks.

It's therefore important to note that the draft zoning scheme for the South Coast Marine Parks considers "moving the boundaries of some sanctuary zones 200 metres from the mainland high water mark to allow for commercial and recreational fishing from and close to the shore."

While this might have shore-based fishers sigh in relief, it's important to note that it's by no means a done deal. Unless enough people comment on specific sanctuary zones requesting a setback, the base case would be no fishing from the shore.

It is more important than ever to make sure that when you complete your submission, you specifically reference your support for a 200m setback in sanctuary zones to allow for shore-based fishing. Even if you're predominately a boat fisher seeking changes to offshore sanctuary zones, such as the ones around Figure of Eight or Woody Island, consider asking for setbacks on beaches where your family and friends go camping and fishing.

This doesn't need to be complicated; for instance, if you are writing about your favourite beach to fish from, it can be as simple as "I believe a 200m setback should be in place to allow for beach fishing at this location."

A sentence as simple as this as part of your submission is the best chance to make a difference.

Talk to DBCA marine park planners at dedicated information station





After mounting concerns and confusion over the details of the marine parks, DBCA have committed to providing faceto-face information sessions for the latter half of the public comment period.

A dedicated information help desk is now located at Esperance Lotteries House, 3 Forrest Street, and is open from 9am-3pm on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays. We understand that dedicated sessions will also be hosted in Hopetoun and Bremer Bay, and will keep you posted when we find out more.

Since the beginning of the public comment period, we have heard your frustrations with the complex nature of the maps and management plans for the proposed marine parks, as well as issues navigating the online portal and being able to put in a simple submission. These sentiments have been echoed by the Shire of Esperance, who have highlighted the lack of in-person engagement from DBCA to help locals understand the information and to be able to put in an effective and well-informed submission.

While we have been more than happy to step up and fill the void by attending fishing comps and talking to fishers about what the plans mean and how to put in an effective submission, we are pleased to see that DBCA have listened to feedback from us, the local community and the Shire of Esperance and are now providing an avenue for in-person assistance.

We encourage you to make use of this service if you require further information on the proposals. As always, we are also available and here to answer your questions or help you put in a submission.

Fishing spot highlight - Gordon Inlet and Trigelow Beach

If you fish the Bremer Bay area, there's a good chance you're well-acquainted with Trigelow Beach. Trigelow is a local favourite for driving along the beach searching for schools of salmon, flicking for herring and skippy, or soaking a bait in hopes of a mulloway or gummy shark. The main track from Bremer to Trigelow drops down to the mouth of the Gordon Inlet, where there are great little camping spots for sitting back and relaxing out of the wind. This part of the coastline, including further on to Point Hood and the Doubtful Islands, is a popular holiday spot for residents and Wheatbelt visitors alike.

Under the proposed zoning scheme for the marine parks, there is a sanctuary zone proposed for Trigelow Beach directly in front of the Gordon Inlet and nearby camping spots. On a dynamic beach such as this, it makes no sense why fishing from the shore for migratory fish species should be prohibited.



Growers urged to report mouse numbers

GRDC

Grain growers across
Australia are being urged
to check paddocks for
mouse numbers and record
mouse activity as part of a
national campaign aimed
at early detection and
effective control ahead of
this year's winter crop.

Concerns about mouse numbers were front of mind at the latest meeting of the National Mouse Group (NMG). NMG is a Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) investment, developed to co-ordinate action to counter mouse plagues and comprising specialist researchers, grain growers, advisers and industry stakeholders.

GRDC supported mouse researcher Steve Henry from CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, is encouraging growers to monitor and log mouse activity this season through the free MouseAlert website, via X (formerly Twitter) using @MouseAlert or through the FeralScan Pest Mapping app.

MouseAlert is a free online tool that allows growers

to record and view mouse activity in their area, aiding in the collective efforts of the National Mouse Group to track and manage mouse populations effectively.

Mr Henry says monitoring also had a key role in providing organisations, such as CSIRO, with a more comprehensive understanding of mouse activity, which could assist in research that informed and improved management strategies for growers.

"We are urging growers to get out of their utes and check their paddocks. Even if you think mouse numbers may be low, get out, walk through paddocks and look closely for any signs of current mouse activity. High stubble loads can hide the signs of mouse activity," Mr Henry says.

Regular monitoring and early identification of mouse infestations is essential. If left unchecked, a mouse population can quickly escalate and result in crop losses, reduced yields, and increased costs associated with pest control measures. In addition to eating crops, mice can also damage infrastructure such as irrigation systems and farm

buildings.

"This year, we are seeing localised and patchy mouse activity. In some areas, good summer rains could lead to increased mouse numbers, but conversely, flood events may have helped to keep mouse populations low. The key message is to monitor," Mr Henry says.

Growers who do record high numbers are advised to apply control measures when background food is at its lowest, which is generally at sowing, to give mice the best chance of finding and eating the bait and to protect germinating crops.

Growers should also be aware that the emergency permit for ZnP50 expired at the at the end of December 2023, so 25g/kg zinc phosphide baits (ZnP25) are currently the only registered bait available. Zinc phosphide bait must be spread according to the label rate of one kilogram per hectare.

Growers are reminded, as with the use of any registered product or product under permit, to report unexpected outcomes (including lack of efficacy or off-target effects) directly to the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority (APVMA)'s Adverse Experience Reporting Program.

While correct use of bait products is critical, GRDC Pest Manager Leigh Nelson says chemical control was only part of the solution.

"It's not just about putting the bait out and hoping for the best, growers need to continue checking paddocks, assess the situation and decide if additional actions are necessary," Dr Nelson says.

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

Project to optimise nutrition for WA pulse crops

Grain growers will have access to new fertiliser guidelines to support the successful integration of newly adapted pulse crops into their farming systems through a new research project underway in Western Australia.

The project will provide nutrition recommendations for phosphorus, potassium and sulphur for adapted pulse crop species of chickpeas, field peas, lentils, faba beans, vetch and lupins to maximise growers' profitability.

The three-year project is an investment of the Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) in partnership with Living Farm.

Living Farm agronomy and operations manager Kathryn Fleay says the project will provide valuable updated information for a range of grain legumes to improve understanding of phosphorus, potassium and sulphur requirements.

The project will include glasshouse experiments, field trials and paddock-scale trials using new technology and analysis tools.

Response curves for phosphorus and potassium will allow growers and industry to quickly and easily determine the most economically efficient fertiliser type and rates to be applied to crops, based on standardised soil analysis.

Sulphur results and recommendations will be delivered to growers and advisors in the form of updated fact sheets and guidelines.

GRDC sustainable cropping solutions manager Dr Rowan Maddern says the project was informed by feedback from western growers, who were eager to adopt pulses into their crop rotations but were seeking better information to inform nutrition programs for these crops.

"There is mounting evidence of the positive benefits from

crop diversity and legumes in a cereal-based system, and WA growers are eager to successfully integrate adapted pulse species into these systems," Dr Maddern says.

"Feedback from GRDC's National Grower Network (NGN) and a grower survey conducted in 2021 indicate that growers are unsure of fertiliser management for pulse species that are new to their operations, a concern amplified by high fertiliser prices.

"This project aims to develop and provide of fertiliser response curves and recommendations that are straightforward and user-friendly for growers, based on current soil test data available in WA."

The project concludes in 2027, with results and resources for growers expected to be published on the GRDC website.
