National Science Week puts the fizz into modern physics

Students in remote Hopetoun and Ravensthorpe were given a rare insight into the mysteries of the universe when the award-winning Einstein-First and Quantum Girls programs visited schools across the district as part of National Science Week.

The innovative program aims to build strong science experiences in the classroom by turning students on to STEM careers and halting the growing shortage of skills in Australia's workforce, particularly underrepresentation of women and a lack of qualified people in the regions.

Developed by science educators from The University of Western Australia and Australian National University, the program is headed by renowned physicist Professor David Blair, who conducted workshops for local students and teachers.

If you've ever wondered why lightning is three times hotter than the sun, why wavy merino wool keeps you warmer, and why the

Eiffel Tower is taller in summer than winter, it's time to brush up on your physics which is the study of how things move, and the forces that make them move - from tiny atoms to whole galaxies.

As well as giving you the edge at your next quiz night, modern physics is the basis for quantum computing and many of the medical and scientific breakthroughs that are creating the jobs of the future.

Regional newcomer and future employer International Graphite is investing early in its STEM workforce and has funded science programs in the Great Southern for the next three years. The company will be one of the first in Australia to produce graphite for batteries in electric vehicles and clean energy technologies, and is working to develop a graphite mine at Springdale, near Hopetoun, and processing facilities at Collie.

Managing Director and CEO Andrew Worland said competition for STEM skills was growing in the resources industry and access

Word of the Day

caustic adjective | KAWSS-tik

Definition:

In general contexts, caustic describes bluntly and harshly critical remarks, statements, or ways of being and communicating, as in "a caustic remark" or "caustic humor." In contexts involving chemistry, caustic is a synonym of corrosive, and is used to describe things capable of destroying or eating away matter by chemical action.

Did You Know?

If you have a burning desire to know the origins of caustic, you're already well on your way to figuring it out. Caustic was formed in Middle English as an adjective describing chemical substances, such as lime and lye, that are capable of destroying or eating away at something. The word is based on the Latin adjective causticus, which itself comes ultimately from the Greek verb kaiein, meaning "to burn." In time, caustic was baked into the English language as an adjective describing people or things (such as wit or remarks) that are bitingly sarcastic. Other kaiein descendants in English include cautery and cauterize, causalgia (a burning pain caused by nerve damage), and encaustic (a kind of paint that is heated after it's applied).

Make your voice heard by becoming a local government councillor

• An appeal to community members to nominate for 2023 local government elections.

• Promotional campaigns underway to increase the diversity of council representation.

• Nominations open on 31 August and close 7 September 2023.

Members of the Western Australian community are being urged to consider nominating for the upcoming local government elections to be able to influence the decisions being made that potentially impact the lives of thousands of residents.

Local Government Minister David Michael said, by standing for local council, candidates will make a valuable contribution to local democracy by putting forward policies and highlighting issues they believe are important to them and their community.

A promotional campaign by the Cook Government, in partnership with the WA Local Government Association, will aim to promote diversity in local government representation with the hope it will result in greater involvement of a wider range of candidates from Aboriginal and multicultural backgrounds, as well as young people and people with disability.

The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries has also teamed up with the Youth Affairs Council of WA to conduct a campaign specifically targeting the 18-24 age group to boost the interest of young people in getting involved in local government.

To provide incentives for people to nominate, the local government reform package includes measures to support a diverse range of people who serve on councils, such as new parental leave entitlements, and changes to enable local governments to pay superannuation and educational allowances to council members.

Nominations for the local government elections to be held on 21 October will open on 31 August and close on 7 September 2023.

Nominations can be lodged online at https://www.elections.wa.gov.au.

"As a former Shire Councillor, I encourage anyone considering running in the upcoming local government elections to nominate before the deadline. I also encourage residents to make sure their vote is counted by participating in the upcoming elections", said Agricultural Region MLC Shelley Payne.

"Helping to build community capacity at a grassroots level and being the voice for your local community is incredibly rewarding and a great way to connect with people. I wish everyone the best of luck in the upcoming local government elections."

"Councillors play a major part in representing the interests of their ratepayers and residents, making decisions to reflect the

needs and wishes of their community and shaping policies that align with a council or shire's future vision and direction," said Local Government Minister David Michael.

"The role of a councillor is an important one - they lead and guide the community, decide how money is spent and propose ideas to make their part of the State a great place to live.

"It's important that local councils are representative of the people they serve. That's why we need people of all backgrounds and life experiences to have a voice and put their hand up to serve their community.

"Women are particularly under-represented in local governments, so I would encourage more women to get involved so we can achieve a better gender balance on councils.

"When I was 25, I was elected to the City of Stirling where I served for 12 years, including as Deputy Mayor, and I am still proud of the projects and service improvements achieved while I was on council. I speak from personal experience when I say that the job of a councillor can be very rewarding.

"If you are considering running in this year's local government elections, I encourage you to lodge a nomination before the closing date and make a valuable contribution that will be beneficial to you and your community."

RAVENSTHORPE HOPETOUN FUTURE FUND Bursary Recipient 2022 - Gab Major

Gab Major was one of the recipients of a \$5,000 bursary from the Ravensthorpe Hopetoun Future Fund in 2022. Since arriving in Ravensthorpe in 2015, Gab has served on more than nine different volunteer groups in the Shire of Ravensthorpe and at the time of receiving the bursary, worked at the Ravensthorpe CRC in the role of manager. She since finished up at the Ravensthorpe CRC and is now working with organisations such as Rave About Arts, Euphorium, Shire of Ravensthorpe and SEGRA.

Gab applied for this bursary to develop new professional skills by engaging an organisation called Euphorium to provide her with monthly coaching sessions for a period of 12 months and also to attend a Value Creators professional development conference.

Gab has provided the RHFF with an update about what she gained from the coaching sessions and how both she and the wider community will benefit from her new skills.

In my application for an RHFF bursary, I put forward that the 'one-degree' of separation that exists in small communities such as Ravensthorpe is the underlying factor in successful, rapid development of grass-roots, community-led activities and initiatives at relatively low cost.

For example, by the time I arrive at work most days, I'll have consulted/developed plans with:

• At least one Shire councillor (conveniently, I don't even have to leave home for this);

- Local school students (handily also in my household);
- Our local school staff/admin and early childhood educators;
- Local businesses (of the coffee variety);
- Community group representatives;
- Fitzgerald Business Network members; and
- Local social media pages.

All this community engagement before I even turn on my computer. Can you even imagine what an external consultant would charge for my daily-morning routine?

Since receiving the RHFF bursary, this thought-bubble has taken centre-stage in my mind, and I have been challenged and supported to explore the upshots of 'one-degree' further through monthly coaching with Euphorium.

Having undertaking coaching in the past, I had a keen understanding of the benefits of this method of professional development over standard workshops or courses. There is far greater accountability to 'do the work' and it requires much more active participation in the learning. I also find myself independently seeking out other texts/research to bring to the coaching sessions. Coaching requires vulnerability which leads to deeper self-awareness and greater capacity to grow and learn. With self-awareness, I am able to develop projects based on my strengths and to mitigate the risks associated with my weaknesses.

One of the most influential parts of the coaching with Euphorium was the opportunity to undertake a PRINT survey. "PRINT® is a model of human motivation and our PRINT® determines our view of the world - why we do what we do, why we are who we are. It is at the core of what we are good at, what gets us excited and what drives us crazy." The Rave About Arts team have also invested in understanding their PRINTs and I'm sure they would join me in recommending it for all teams - be they volunteer committees, work groups or even families (especially farming families facing succession). With my PRINT in hand, much of my coaching sessions focused on the 'why' using Euphorium's 'Problem Definition Process'.

- Why is the condition of 'one-degree' helpful?
- Why would I seek to develop ever-greater connectivity across a community?
- Why do some community development activities succeed and others fail?

As Euphorium already works extensively in the community, I have been able to share this experience with friends and colleagues - this is an opportunity often lacking in the coaching approach, so I believe I had the best of both worlds. I also enjoyed sharing my learnings with the CRC and FBN teams during my time there.

Ultimately, I have come to understand that psychological safety is an absolute necessity for an individual to flourish and contribute to community and that one-degree of separation (everyone knowing and trusting everyone) is the secret sauce. This led to a reframing of CRC initiatives to prioritise the building of psychological safety amongst the Ravensthorpe community by reducing the degrees of separation.

Having dug to this level of understanding, my focus now is on sifting through the many community development 'toolkits' to gather and learn techniques and strategies that fast track one-degree communities.

After I had used the bursary funds, I decided to continue with my coaching sessions with Euphorium and I signed up to The Catalyst Club, which is regionally-focussed and provides group coaching on mindset and business.

The confidence to venture beyond the comfort of the CRC was, I'm sure, due to the bursary-funded coaching and mentoring and I highly recommend investing in coaching for anyone that wants to push past their comfort zone. It's really useful for things like goal setting and strategy development, starting a new business, growing/pivoting your business, better managing staff, improving productivity and maintaining a healthy mindset just to name a few. The one-to-one nature makes coaching a much higher cost activity than other workshops and courses but the RHFF bursary meant that I could take it on without financial risk and reap all the benefits that come from this style of professional development.

Candidates complete their nomination details and profile, print the completed form which has a reference number allocated and lodge it with the Returning Officer. Rural mental health receives funding support \$250,000 in grants awarded

FRRR's In a Good Place (IAGP) program has awarded \$250,000 in grants to 17 local organisations from remote, rural and regional Australia, for initiatives that will support and promote the mental health and wellbeing of locals in their communities.

Funded in partnership with CCI Giving, the IAGP program gives small rural communities across Australia the opportunity to access funds of up to \$20,000 for communitydriven projects that support vulnerable community members who are at risk of, or are experiencing, mental health issues. Since 2018, the IAGP program has helped to fund 70 mental health-focused projects across remote, rural and regional Australia.

This year, the 17 funded initiatives include community activities to help people feel connected, training to help people identify those who are at risk of harming themselves, mental health first aid courses, and one-on-one mentoring.

Jeremy Yipp, Chair of CCI Giving, said support for mental health projects is vital for effective recovery to take place.

"In this round, we saw a notable increase in the number of expressions of interest that referenced community recovery from the accumulative economic, social and emotional impacts of successive natural disasters and the

pandemic.

"We're in a crucial period of recovery and now is the time to support mental health initiatives in rural Australia and make sure that communities have the resources they need to recover from all that's gone on in the last few years," Mr Yipp said.

Jill Karena, FRRR's People Programs Portfolio Lead, said that loneliness is prevalent across rural communities and that many people are feeling disconnected from their community.

"In the applications for this round, we read about a lot of projects explicitly addressing loneliness and social isolation.

"For example, in the Queensland community of Stanthorpe, Happy Chat Peer Support Group will use a \$20,000 grant to expand the organisation and provide facilitated support to vulnerable community members living with mental illness, helping to reduce their social isolation and loneliness, and to provide access to meaningful community-based activities.

"There is a clear need for social connection within remote, rural and regional communities and we're grateful for our continued partnership with CCI Giving, as it allows us to provide much needed funding to help combat the loneliness we're seeing in communities throughout rural Australia," Ms Karena said. Some of the 17 initiatives being funded include:

•Community Housing -Kempsey, NSW - Treasured Insights (Mental Health-Inside Out Recovery) - Build the capacity of community housing staff and tenants to understand hording and domestic squalor disorders to assist recovery and improve the lives of vulnerable people living in social housing. \$14,588

• Sisters of Charity Community Care -Toowoomba, QLD - Dragonfly Health & Wellness Retreat - Enhance the mental health and wellbeing of rural women by providing a threeday retreat to enable participants to connect, learn self-care, and seek support. \$11,000

• Yankalilla Youth Arts -Yankalilla, SA - Sunday Sessions - Provide a creative and nurturing space for young people to engage in guided arts and theatre-based activities, with the presence of a counsellor and support therapy dog to support mental health and wellbeing. \$12,260

• Highways and Byways - St Helens, TAS - Free2Fly - Support isolated, vulnerable and disadvantaged young women to be confident and resilient through a oneto-one tailored mentoring program. \$19,998

• Goulburn Valley Suicide Awareness Group Inc - Yea, VIC - GVSAG Walk and Talk - Support the local community to connect and develop trusted relationships that create greater understanding of mental health issues and address the stigma surrounding suicide by upskilling volunteers, establishing facilitated support groups and holding a suicide awareness walk. \$20,000

• Enterprise Partnerships WA Limited - Balgo, WA - Piriwa Wellbeing Project - Develop individual resilience, confidence, group leadership and planning skills through intergenerational activities and regular yarning circles to strengthen cultural identity, self- agency and mental wellbeing of Aboriginal women in a remote community. \$20,000

Young people whose parents receive welfare far less likely to be working or studying

Young people whose parents receive welfare payments are far less likely to be working or studying in late adolescence, according to research by the Australian Institute of Family Studies (AIFS).

The study has revealed adolescents had 80% higher odds of not being in employment or in education or training at age 18-19 if a parent received welfare for 3.5 years or more over a 15-year period, and 51% higher odds if their parent received any welfare.

The research used survey responses from the Growing Up in Australia: Longitudinal Study of Australian Children (LSAC) - which has been tracking thousands of Australian children for two decades - paired with Centrelink data for the primary parents from 2002 to 2017.

Overall, at age 18-19, around 1 in 12 (8%) adolescents were not engaged in education, employment or training.

More than 40% of adolescents were both studying and working, 30% were working only and 19% of were studying only.

LSAC Program Lead, Dr Lisa Mundy from AIFS, said the findings have implications for policymakers, as well as employers and local communities.

"We know that not being in education, employment or training in adolescence can impact on many aspects of life," Dr Mundy said.

"Young people in this situation often experience lower rates of academic performance, lower rates of employment, more social exclusion, and poorer physical and mental health outcomes.

"When governments at all levels work effectively with employers and local communities to address entrenched disadvantage, there is a real opportunity to break the cycle, and make a lasting difference to young people and their families," Dr Mundy said.

Minister for Social Services, Amanda Rishworth, said this research is further proof that young people experiencing economic disadvantage have not been getting the support and interventions they need.

"Young people have been consistently overlooked. That's why the Treasurer and I worked to deliver an almost \$200 million investment in the last Budget to tackle entrenched disadvantage. The package has a strong focus on giving young people a voice to come up with their own solutions to meet their needs and aspirations," Minister Rishworth said.

"We want to see more community-led initiatives like the Burnie Works 'Every Day Counts' school attendance campaign, which empowered young people to explore the issues that impact their ability to attend school, and identify youth-led ways to support school attendance. Their solution was an advertisement which shows primary and secondary school-aged children being affected practically and emotionally when their friends don't come to school.

"Evidence shows that targeted investment in community-led projects like this across the country will help break the cycle of intergenerational disadvantage and improve outcomes for young people," Minister Rishworth said.

Growing up in Australia - the Longitudinal Study of Australian Children (LSAC) is an ongoing national study. In 2004 around 5,000 babies aged up to one, and 5,000 4 to 5 year-olds and their families were recruited and have been surveyed every two years since. This has given researchers a deep understanding of the experiences of children and young people growing up in Australia.
