41st Annual Wildflower Festival Off with a Bang

That is how one must describe the first day of the 41st Wildflower Show. Over 200 eager people streamed through the door to be amazed at the beautiful, colourful, interesting and scientific displays within the town hall.

The day culminated with the official opening of the show. Dignitaries in attendance included Harley Coyne and Annie Dabb, Noongar Elders, Professor Stephen Hopper AC, Keith Bradby OAM, Shelley Payne MLC Member for the Agricultural Region, Peter Rundle MLA Deputy Leader of the Opposition, Matthew Bird Ravensthorpe Shire CEO, Ravensthorpe Shire councillors and Ian Mickle Esperance Shire president.

The ceremony started with Harley welcoming us to Country. The Carnaby Cockatoo silhouettes forming the backdrop on the stage was an apt reminder of the theme of this year's show.

Jenny Biddulph, Ravensthorpe Wildflower Show chair, welcomed all visitors and acknowledged sponsors which include

Tourism WA, Allkem, First Quantum Minerals, Ravensthorpe Shire, Go West, Irene & Robert Bawden, Bush Heritage Australia, DBCA and Dr Manus Lochner of Cape Mount Barren Wines.

The Qualup Choir was then invited to perform Kaya–a Noongar welcome song which was followed by a song (written by Toni Ardent) rejoicing in the re-birth of nature after fire, and another song from Eve Green celebrating the Qualup Bell.

Keith Bradby, CEO of the

Gondwana Link project gave the opening address. His reflection on the last 40 years of conservation efforts, such as the establishment of the 1000 km long Gondwana Link bush corridor and insights into what the next 40 years could be looking like was thought provoking.

By the year 2063, Keith believes there will be better farming and mining practices, more in tune with nature; he was, however, unwilling to make predictions about the climate that might prevail Photo supplied

Professor Steve Hopper, a conservation biologist internationally reknowned, paid tribute to the encyclopaedic knowledge of natural systems held by First Nation people.

He explained that the seemingly untouched landscape viewed by the first European settlers was not 'virgin' bush, but actually a deeply 'humanised' landscape, fashioned by Australia's first inhabitants.



Word of the Day

orotund adjective | OR-uh-tund

Definition:

Orotund is a formal word used as a synonym of sonorous to describe something-usually a voice-marked by fullness, strength, and clarity of sound. It can also be used disapprovingly to mean "pompous" or "bombastic."

Did You Know?

An experiment: first breathe in deeply, then try to sing the strongest, lowest note that you can, at the utmost floor of your register. How lovely. Now, what vowel did you sing for your one-syllable song? We'll bet you a skillet full of bacon it was o. Why? Shaping one's mouth into an o-shape is pretty much a surefire way to produce an orotund or resonant sound, that is, one that is full, strong, and loud. Try the same exercise with a long e sound, as in sleep, and see (or hear) what we mean. Orotund comes from the Latin phrase ore rotundo, literally meaning "with round mouth." It was adopted into English in the late 18th century to describe the strength of one's vocal delivery but has since picked up an additional sense of "pompous" or "bombastic" to describe inflated speech that may be full of sound and fury, yet signifies nothing.



Greetings All.

My name is Julia Bell. I have been a Ravensthorpe Shire Councillor for 2 years and am re-nominating for another term. For those ratepayers and community members who do not know me I shall provide a little of my background. I have lived in Ravensthorpe for the past 30 years. I rocked into town (literally) 30 Years ago with 5 carnels that walked with me, solo for 5 months, across the Nullarbor Plain. I have always loved this country of tall salmon gums, saltbush and bluebush understory.



30 years ago, I purchased a property 3 kms out from Ravensthorpe, on the Hopetoun Road. My little piece of heaven needed much care, love and

maintenance. My dream was to clean up; plant more trees; develop a vegetable garden and fruit orchard with long term sustainability in mind.

My vision was to create an ecological haven; to share and introduce my camels to the community and to offer joyful camel rides to the children in the town. I have achieved all this and so much more.

In the early years I opened my farm to the community for children's birthday parties; giving free camel rides. I also had a small trekking business, inviting tourist to the area. I trekked my camels through the salmon gum country down to Hopetoun. I established camel trekking on the Hopetoun Beach for the community and tourists.

20 years I established Dingos Dog Kennel on my farm. My kennels have been used by many community members as well as tourists visiting the Fitzgerald National Park. During my time in Ravensthorpe, I have cared for many injured wildlife from kangaroos to sea eagles, frogmouth nightjars and reptiles. I have on many occasions voluntarily cared for stray dogs, until their owner has been found.

About 11 years ago I was approached to Chair the Community Spirit Newspaper. During this time the paper was at a crisis and on the brink of closing. I took up the challenge and within the year had a great committee on board. With a positive outlook and leadership, the volunteers and paid staff were building wonderful relationships and a flourishing team spirit. I continued in this role for about 5 years. I resigned as the Chairperson, however am still on the committee.

During the past 30 years I have continued with my profession as a Registered, Remote Area Nurse.

I have nursed at the Ravensthorpe Hospital, Lake Grace Hospital and Dumbleyung Hospital. I spent 4 wonderful years as the Practice Nurse for Dr. Lochner in Ravensthorpe and Hopetoun. I recently spent 3 years as Clinical Nurse Specialist in remote area clinics in the Northern Territory, Arnhem Land, Horn Island and Cue. On my return I continued my Practice Nurse work with Dr. Lochner in Hopetoun caring for chronic disease and vaccination clinics. As well as my paid nursing work I have cared for many elderly in the community on a voluntary basis. I have enjoyed visiting them in their homes and offering palliative care. My love of writing has encouraged me to be part of the local writers' group, called Southern Scribes. I have contributed to a group writing project called "Fly South". I have participated in their fundraising efforts by walking from Ravensthorpe to Hopetoun. This provided funds to publish one of their many books. Furthermore. I have published in a Science Journal. About 14 years ago I established the Eremia Amphitheatre, west of Ravensthorpe on the Old Newdegate Road. This beautiful open- air amphitheatre was situated on undulating farm land, exposing a vista of sunsets and the ambience of the Ravensthorpe Range. I poured my creativity, love of classical music and personal finances into a vision for the whole community to enjoy. I had success with well known musicians and artists, including the world-famous James Morrison.

Since I have been a Ravensthorpe Shire Councillor, I have been successful in promoting Motions which have been carried by an absolute majority. One issue was to establish conservation Initiatives for Carnaby Cockatoos and the second issue was to improve fire mitigation controls.

Finally, I instigated a Shire Cat Control Policy.

We rented the property where the shop now is, in late September 2017 and spent the next month turning it from an eyesore into the beginnings of what you see today. Kerry's husband, lan, cleared all the outside mess and my son-in-law, Hamish, basically renovated the building and painted the outside. Kerry, Corina and myself cleaned and painted the inside.

So, "Crazy Granny's" was born. We had an opening night on October 20th, 2017. The shop was run as a family business until we closed on December 10th, 2021. Kerry and Ian have moved to be closer to family.

On a sunny afternoon at Wavecrest, Tracee held her event, "8 Months of Memories in Hopetoun with Crazee Tracee."


The event entertained as she performed songs she had honed over the last eight months at open mic sessions in the town. Her melodies and raps have been engaging performances at these gatherings.

BAITING TO PROTECT

NATIVE WILDLIFE

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's *Western Shield* program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.

Living and Learning OUR Fitzgerald Biosphere

August 17th and 18th saw our National Science Week event (twice) across the East and the West of the Fitzgerald Biosphere (FB). The genesis of this event was to showcase UNESCO FB principles and highlight recent research within the region.

Merningar Bardok Elder and UWA Research Associate Auntie Lynnette Knapp welcomes us, throughout the morning sharing with us personal stories from her childhood, endorsing research and sharing her lived experiences as she teaches us; '..Country evokes the story'.

She recites to us creation stories, cultural lore and memories relevant to the areas she speaks for and where we visit.

Introducing UNESCO Biosphere principles, Nathan McQuoid shows us where we sit geologically and socially '..to get our heads and hearts around the place' and begin to '..get the dogma out this stuff and start knowing Country.'

Providing FBCC updates and valuable take homes for us all as community members within the FB. Professor Steve Hopper follows with the need to include a focus on processes when it comes to biodiversity - balance, flux, evolution, endemic species and hybridisation - and the importance of understanding these things in the context of Landcare particularly in OCBILs (Old Climatically Buffered Infertile Landscapes), such as what we find in the Fitzgerald Biosphere.

Referencing minimal or complete lack of endemic species in prominent areas overseas comparable to East Mt Barren - 'you have anywhere between 10, 15, 20, 30 endemics depending on how you define it (East Mt Barren)..people get excited about the Fitzgerald, but it ain't half the story.

It's your properties in the buffer and transition zones too'

Dr Alison Lullfitz compliments the narrative by highlighting the two-way science approach to research that underpins the Walking together project work.

One catalyst to demonstrate this was looking for the gaps between the National Biodiversity Hotspots (places needing the most attention within the nation) and overlaying the use of Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK) when informing these conservation areas and projects. Eight of Australia's 15 declared biodiversity hotspots are in WA.

The south west of WA is also an internationally recognised Biodiversity hotspot.

Talking Mungee - a teacher, provider, connector, exemplar: what's not to celebrate about the world's largest mistletoe, Nuytsia floribunda project demonstrates the crosscultural work between 3 Knapp family generations, Lullfitz and Hopper when looking at a well-known species to the SW- Nuytsia floribunda or the Mungee tree. Intergenerational learning on Country, Noongar Boodja, maintains ecological knowledge and cultural connections that have been refined for around 60,000 years.

PhD Candidate Ursula Rodrigues brings her focus on Caring for Country with fire - using a transdisciplinary approach to begin teasing apart the western science and Noongar knowledge when it comes to burning in this region.

Whilst there is still analysis to be done, she has found that even within seasons that are suitable for burning there is nuance in application of fire based on the type of plants and what it is required to achieve good regenerative, cultural and ecological outcomes.

As the Fitzgerald Biosphere region lays at a Noongar nation crossroads we acknowledge the Menang, Goreng, Merningar, Wirlomin and Wudjari Custodians and their Elders. By utilising two-way science methodology, engaging with Biosphere principles of reconciling sustainable development alongside conservation of biodiversity and looking at how we can understand these OCBIL landscapes together, we as a community can celebrate OUR Fitzgerald Biosphere.

The Gray family members/ YAC - Menang Elders Aunties Carol Pettersen, Val Swift, Roni Forrest, Liza Kerley Gray, Uncle Kimberley Gray and their niece Belinda Swift - shared their delight to be able to meet for these 2 days to showcase and celebrate their historical

connection to this area - citing love and connection for this place since 1938 with 11 of the 17 siblings attending school here. Furthermore noting 'Every year there is a theme, this year's is about celebrating our role as elders in the community, as nurturers, nurses and carers to lead everything in our community'.

Wellstead Primary students, teachers and Principal arrive to join the festivities, beginning with the Aboriginal and Torres Strait flags raised under the guidance of Uncle Kimberley Gray.

Multiple bus trips take us to the original Gray family camp area, today, transformed by refining a series of paths and breakout cleared areas through the woodland into a custom made bush classroom for all-aged Noongar learnings.

We begin by hearing about the importance of fire. Fire is significant. Fire represents healing as Uncle Kimberley mentions; (to) 'As you walk past it and through the smoke, it takes all the bad spirits out'. Fire is used for yarning, meeting, cooking, eating.

The sisters tend the flames at just the right intensity as local melaleuca branches are laid on to make the familiar scented moist smoke that is used to wash us over as we are welcomed to walk through and begin the rotation of activities.

The senior grades broke off to learning at the Burial memorial, a collaboration of local landholder Rex Parsons, the Yarramoup Aboriginal Corporation and the Jerramungup Shire to acknowledge the area as culturally significant. Students also gained knowledge taught through Auntie Carol's lived experience combined with maps outlining language groups and creation pathways.

Standing at the crossroad of 5 tribal nations (Menang, Goreng, Willmen, Wudjari, Merningar) students could point out where they remember their families are from and where they grew up.

Auntie Carol shares with us that she recalls her travels through the landscape 'was like the pages of a book opening up in front of me', singing these trails is like her GPS. 'We are not curators of our stories.

Our culture is still alive' We don the family totem - Yirrdah (Western spinebill) learning 'totems are conservation' before making our way back to the camp.

The Gray siblings take turns with various classes to contribute their knowledge, lived experiences and creativity through art, language lessons, story telling, ochre facepainting, music with tapping sticks, song and dance.

The next morning we embark on painting a giant Wagyl canvas, students making time to contribute to the piece under the supervision of Auntie Carol guiding painting as story. Belinda takes students and teachers in need of some wellness and bush connection, where they all sit quietly and listen to the sounds of the bush, imagining what it was like back in time.

Listening to how Aboriginal family groups would travel through and see different colours in the landscape, soil types that would determine differences in plants and bush tuckers.

Meeting back at the school, students share their favourite things, learnings and most importantly their personal Thank you's for sharing your family experiences as Noongar women and men, sons and daughters, mothers and fathers, nurses, teachers and students from a life growing up down the road in the bush. Just as the Stars were painted on the canvas to represent mother Kathleen and father Colin Gray, I am sure they wish they were standing with you all by the campfire sharing kaartijan (knowledge) at their bush camp classroom there today.

This event was presented by Yarramoup Aboriginal Corporation, Jerramungup District High school in collaboration with Wellstead Primary and the Fitzgerald Biosphere Community Collective (FBCC) and is thanks to support from Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, Lotterywest, CBH group and WA Landcare Network.



We joined Uncle Eugene Eades (Uncle Euy) in the meeting place mia mia at Nowanup Reserve after a quick morning tea and begin heartfelt discussions to welcome, introduce, heal and reconcile.

We learnt about 'court to country' programs that has seen young fellas making their way to Nowanup for Bush school, eco-restoration efforts that have placed Nowanup on the map for the whole world to see, using family members' Totems planted in art form as a show of respect, using the 'Wadjula way of restoration to tell 2 stories on 1 land.'



Uncle Euy making us 'Yarn carrier's'.. in the meeting place Mia Mia - he notes 'Noongar are the biggest story tellers out they reckon'.



Walk through the bush to the second meeting place, along the way we stop for views and calendar plants flowering - indicating goannas preparing to lay their eggs in the termite mounds.

We look over the escarpment

discussing the future of walking trails and other collaborative projects with like-minded stakeholders, Bush Heritage Australia (BHA) and Greening Australia - Nowanup Caretakers' helping with trail works and planting projects.

Dr Alison Lullfitz, a local community and friends' member shares her experience with not only the Eades family, but helping us to understand the importance of Noongar inclusion in University projects. Uncle Euy, himself an Adjunct Associate Professor with Curtin University.





Ecologist Sarah Comer introducing us to Monjebup North

Sarah Comer - BHA Ecologist and Friends' member showed us around Monjebup north reserve - an ecological restoration project delivered by BHA, implementing the high-grade restoration practices using direct seeding and infill planting to restore native vegetation on previously cleared paddocks.

Matching appropriate local plant species with soil types, plantings have become productive enough for animals to move on in.

We hear Crested Bellbird and Emus as we navigate vegetation to find an active Malleefowl mound - and hopefully in time, vegetation recruitment willt eventually reduce the tell-tale lines of human machinery intervention within this reserve.

Sarah spoke to us on many topics -Felixer grooming traps which have been designed to specifically target feral cats and how they work, Bush Heritage's integrated predator management work, vegetation and fauna monitoring, technology and song meters, Yate swamps with cultural and ecosystem significance and getting a closer look at empty pygmy possum nest boxes!

We were fortunate to book the whole Red Moort Field station accommodation and kitchen facilities for this weekend, referencing plants found that day with their BHA herbarium and Friends' members expertise. It was a great way to spend a few days in the Fitzgerald Biosphere.

Presented by the Fitzgerald Biosphere Community Collective and Friends of the Fitzgerald River National Park for National Science week on August 19th and 20th. We thank Lotterywest for funding this weekend, Uncle Eugene and Rocky Eades from Nowanup Enterprises LTD and Sarah Comer from Bush Heritage Australia for guidance through BHA projects.
