

"Just jump out and run Tristan when you can!"


"Make sure you don't leave Mum's bag behind Wotan."


2023 Wildflower Photography Competition winners announced





1st Place Adult–Calothamnus validus, commonly known as Barrens Clawflower by Hsiaochun.

Judges comments: The first place winning photograph truly stands out thanks to its dynamic composition, high contrast, and engaging perspective. This captivating image draws the viewer in with its striking contrast between light and shadow, creating a visually compelling and dramatic effect. The choice of perspective adds depth and dimension to the scene, making it feel immersive and intriguing.






3rd Place Adult–Banksia speciosa, commonly known as the Showy Banksia, by Jackie Edwards.





4th Place Adult–Melaleuca, commonly known as Honey Myrtle by Stephen Jeffrey.

COUNCIL APPROVES CHANGE IN AGREEMENT WITH LIVINGSTON MEDICAL

At the Ordinary Council Meeting on Tuesday 19 September 2023, Council considered and approved revisions to its Medical Services Agreement with Livingston Medical.

The update states Livingston Medical, rather than an individual doctor, as the provider of health services for the Shire of Ravensthorpe.

Council noted a Disclosure of Interest from Cr Rachel Livingston, who was not present for the duration of the consideration.

The variation to the agreement allows Dr Michael Livingston the flexibility to work outside the Shire, engage in rural generalist training, and maintain a local medical presence.

Livingston Medical has recently recruited five Rural Generalist doctors to their team as well as three more nurses, and they have expanded their practice to include surrounding Shires.

Current patients of Dr Livingston in Ravensthorpe and Hopetoun will still have access to Telehealth appointments when he is not in the Shire of Ravensthorpe.

Patients will also have access to Dr Menon, who is based in Hopetoun and recently passed his exams in the top 10% cohort. A new medical practitioner, Dr Bahari, is commencing in January and will be based in Ravensthorpe.

PREPARE YOUR FIREBREAKS

The Shire of Ravensthorpe Fire Control and Firebreak Notice 2023/2024 was recently sent out to ratepayers with the annual rates notice, and it is also available for viewing on the Shire of Ravensthorpe website. The link is on the opposite page.

Now is a good time to start planning your firebreaks.

They must be in place on 31 October 2023 and then maintained until 30 April 2024.

It is important to note, the notice includes an update for residents in rural and rural residential zoned property.



RURAL AREAS

Major changes for all land zoned as "rural" include:

Any Rural Land, Rural Small Holdings less than 200Ha and not being managed in a large single
entity farming operation that includes stock and/or cropping practices: i. Areas of unmanaged
pasture or grassland must have a 20 metre wide bare earth firebreak constructed and
maintained inside ALL external boundaries. ii. Breaks to provide a 5 metre vertical clearance so
that the firebreak provides unrestricted vehicular access. and, iii. Driveways must be cleared to
a minimum of 4 metres wide and 5 metres in height, and must provide unrestricted access to
emergency service vehicles

RURAL RESIDENTIAL

All land zoned as "rural residential" must:

- Clear either a 3 metre wide bare earth firebreak or a 3 metre wide mulched/slashed firebreak immediately inside on ALL external boundaries. Breaks should also have a 5 metre vertical clearance so that the firebreak provides unrestricted vehicular access
- Parkland clearing must be carried out in all open paddocks and along the boundary of the property. Clearing means that all dead vegetation and flammable material (excluding approved crops, pasture areas and living trees/shrubs) are removed
- Unmanaged pasture and grasslands must be maintained to height no greater than 100 millimetres
- A 3 metre wide bare earth firebreak shall be located around fuel storage tanks, sheds, gas cylinders and within 6 metres of haystacks. Haystacks cannot be situated on the external boundary

THE WAY WE WERE


An address to opening of the Cultural Precinct by Ravensthorpe Historical Society President, Andrew Chapman on Monday September 11th, 2023.

Every historical narrative has its beginning so it is appropriate for me to acknowledge that Aboriginal people have walked, lived in and managed the rivers, creeks, hills, valleys, sandplains and coastal environments of this land for some 45,000 years give or take a few thousand. This is as opposed to our European occupancy of a mere 150 years.

European occupancy of what is now Ravensthorpe Shire commenced in 1868 when Dunn brothers John, James, Robert, Walter and George arrived from Woodburn near Porongorups to establish Cocanarup pastoral lease. In 1898 James (Jim) Dunn decided to try his hand at mineral prospecting and found payable gold, not just traces of it, in Annabel Creek just west of where we are now and was granted a reward claim. This discovery precipitated a gold rush which lasted until 1911 and some would say, with some truth, has ebbed and flowed ever since, though now it would be more appropriate to describe it as a mineral rush.

Following James Dunn's discovery things moved very fast indeed. In 1898/99 prospectors settled in a bush timber and canvas settlement called Hawks Nest just east of where Allkem is mining today. In 1900, Alfred Canning, of Canning Stock Route fame, surveyed both Ravensthorpe and Hopetoun townsites, both were gazetted in 1901, the year of Federation of Australian states and territories. It is interesting to speculate why Canning and the Government chose the top of a hill for the site of the new town. I suspect that access to the Hawks Nest site, particularly for horse drawn vehicles, was difficult due to Cattlin Creek having to be crossed on both the south and west sides. Another benefit was that the town has never been flooded: however the Railway Station and the business hub of the town would be forever separated by a steep incline.

Ravensthorpe was named after the Ravensthorpe Range and Hopetoun after the Earl of Hopetoun, Australia's first Governor General. The first instrument of civic administration was the declaration in 1900 of WA's smallest Goldfield, the Phillips River Goldfield and Mining Warden FW Spence took up his position in the same year. The Warden's Court was at the site currently occupied by the Police Station. Spence was a remarkable man; prior to coming to Ravensthorpe he was awarded a Royal Australasian Humane Society Bravery Award for rescuing a drowning man in Sydney

Harbour. As the first and only senior bureaucrat he was also: local magistrate, court registrar, mining registrar, coroner, registrar of births, deaths and marriages, treasury paymaster and marriage celebrant. Spence Street in Ravensthorpe is named after him and his house is still present in the street of that name. He married in Ravensthorpe in 1908 and continued as Warden until 1910.

There is another interesting aspect to the Goldfields declaration, which is still with us today. Most of the early farms still include miner's homestead leases (MHLs) in their certificate of title; this is because due to the declaration of a Goldfield, the only option for land tenure was to hold one of these leases even if the purpose had nothing at all to do with mining. For example, Arthur Chambers and David Neil took up MHL 5 of 200 acres in 1901 for farming and planted Ravensthorpe's first crop the following year. The Phillips River Road Board was established in 1903 and became the Shire of Ravensthorpe in 1961.


In the first decade of the twentieth century Ravensthorpe was very different than it is today; in particular then it had: four hotels and a brewery, three churches, its own newspaper, 'The Phillips River Times' which was printed locally, a butter factory/dairy (though history records the butter factory didn't produce any butter), an aerated cool drink factory, a concrete skating rink, a professional photographer,

Walter Elston, with his own studio, a Railway Station connected by railway to the port of Hopetoun, a Government Smelter an assay office/laboratory, a brick factory and an abattoir/slaughter house.

At the time the population was about 2,000 people. This figure probably included the population of Hopetoun as well as the mining settlement of Hatters Hill; even so, it is more people than live in the Shire of Ravensthorpe today.

And now we come to where we stand today. The present Community Centre was the former Commercial Hotel (also known as Brown's Hotel) was built in 1906 of locally produced bricks; it was the first two storey building in town. The site of our brand new building was initially the site of both a general store and the 'Miner's Arms' Hotel; both established by Dunn Bros. in 1901. The Senior Citizens Centre which later occupied this site was demolished to enable this building. The block for the Senior Citizens Centre was donated to the community by the Archer family, Formerly Westpac Bank and a Wesfarmers Co-operative also occupied the site. The former Shire Office was formerly the WA Bank, built from bricks imported from Germany in 1908. Formerly owned by FE Daw & Sons it was initially rented by the Shire and purchased by it in 1985.

I hope I have presented a small insight into Ravensthorpe's journey, a journey that I'm sure still has a long way to run.

Snake Handling Workshops

In a bid to enhance community safety and equip residents with the knowledge and skills to deal with snakes safely, two comprehensive snake handling workshops were recently conducted at the Hopetoun Community Resource Centre (CRC).

These workshops, generously funded by the local resources company, FQM, aimed to educate and empower community members in the art of snake relocation.

The well attended workshops were run by Ann Gerlach from Bob Cooper's Snake Rescue & Relocation team and covered a range of topics including Psychology of fear, Legal responsibilities, First aid treatment, Catching equipment/dress code, Holding containers/bags, Correct catching techniques, Live snake-catching scenarios.

Ann used live pythons, death adders, king browns, tiger snakes, dugites and gwardars for the training.

In addition to the workshops, Ann conducted an informative session at the Hopetoun Youth & Art Space. Over 20 local teenagers attended, learning about snake safety and responsibility.

The session covered topics such as understanding snake behaviour, recognising local snake species, and the latest snake bite first aid.

Local residents who attended the workshops expressed their gratitude for the opportunity to acquire essential snake handling skills and qualification certificates. Many participants mentioned feeling more confident in dealing with snake encounters and appreciated the workshops' emphasis on safety and conservation.

We are well into spring and with the increased warmth, we can expect to start seeing more of our scaly friends around town. Don't panic! If a snake is on your property and you need help from a snake handler, then follow these simple steps:

- 1. Keep an eye on the snake. They are so hard to find once you have lost sight! If the snake is in the sun and laying still, try not to startle it.
- 2. Jump on the messenger link on the local Facebook page Hopetoun Snake Relocation Volunteers Or contact the Hopetoun CRC if you don't have Facebook.
- 3. Put your name, address, and phone number in the message.
- 4. If you have a photo of the snake then please send it as well.

Snakes are a part of life here in Hopetoun. Mostly, we don't notice them around. They keep our vermin levels down and take care of the environment.
