Ravensthorpe election results declared

The votes in the Shire of Ravensthorpe Local Government Election have been checked and verified by the Western Australian Electoral Commission.

At 12 midday on Tuesday October 24th 2023 the Returning Officer declared the results as follows:

Rachel Gibson, Karen Sinclair, Mark Mudie and Sue Leighton have been elected to the office of councillor in the district of Ravensthorpe on fouryear terms that will expire in October 2027.

Shire of Ravensthorpe CEO Matthew Bird congratulated the successful candidates.

"It's great to have two brand new councillors in Rachel Gibson and Karen Sinclair, who are obviously very passionate about their community," he said.

"I also look forward to working once more with Mark Mudie and Sue Leighton who have been re-elected." Mr Bird also thanked everyone who voted and had their say in choosing who represents the community.

"To have 59.9% turnout at a local government election is a wonderful effort and shows how highly our community feels about having their say."

A Special Council Meeting will be held in the next week to vote for the new President and Deputy President.

Word of the Day

inculcate verb | in-KUL-kayt

What it means:

Inculcate is a formal word that has to do with teaching and persuading especially by frequent repetition. If you inculcate someone, you gradually cause the person to fully understand something. If you inculcate an ideal, practice, or behavior in someone, you impress it upon them.

Did You Know?

Sometimes before a lesson sinks in, you've got to go over it in your mind for a long time. The same is true for when you want to make a path: you have to walk over it again and again. The connection between walking and learning is at the heart of inculcate, which comes from a form of the Latin verb inculcare, meaning "to tread on." In Latin, inculcare possesses both literal and figurative meanings, referring to either the act of walking over something or to that of impressing something upon the mind, often by way of steady repetition. It is the figurative sense that survives with inculcate, which was first used in English in the 16th century. Since then, the word has kept the meaning of impressing facts, ideas, or ideals on someone through repetition. If you have trouble remembering inculcate's definition, you may find it helpful to know that it's a synonym of the word instill ("to impart gradually"), which shares the Latin prefix in-.

Aussie online shoppers urged to download AusPost App

October is Cyber Awareness Month and Australia Post is encouraging customers to download its free AusPost app to better protect themselves and their personal information. Ahead of the year's busiest shopping season, Australia Post is reminding shoppers the AusPost app is the best way to get trusted, accurate and legitimate delivery notifications that protect customer security.

All too often customers are targeted with fake scam text messages and emails about parcel deliveries, prompting them to click links in an attempt to gain personal or financial information. The AusPost app provides customers with a secure place to receive updates and tracks parcels along their journey. Recently, Australia Post updated the functionality to include in-app notifications for missed deliveries and parcel collection (which can be accessed once customers enable in-app notifications in their app settings).

Out of the 11 million Australians who have registered MyPost accounts, less than half of these customers (5.1 million) actively use the AusPost app. Customers who have the AusPost app get access to the following features for Australia Post parcels that can be matched to their MyPost Account:

- Estimated delivery timeframe notifications
- Real-time delivery updates and instant push notifications
- Contactless access to Parcel Lockers
- Photos of Safe Drop Images
- Seamless redirects to Parcel Lockers or Post Offices

Michael McNamara, Australia Post Executive General Manager Digital, Technology and Data, said the AusPost app is the most trustworthy way to get Australia Post delivery updates.

"We know the AusPost app is a popular and trusted source of information for users, with customers using it an average of 12 times a month. Users are also more likely to use delivery choices like Parcel Lockers and Safe Drops and less likely to contact the call centre compared to nonapp users," Mr. McNamara said.

Professor Monica Whitty, Head of Department Software Systems and Cybersecurity at Monash University said: "Online shopping for Christmas presents has become the norm. However, shoppers need to be mindful of the multitude of online scams; for example, websites created by scammers, many of which look at first glance to be genuine, and scammer texts that appear to come from Australia Post or other couriers which trick consumers who are expecting a delivery.

"I encourage shoppers, who are seeking out the perfect gift for their loved ones, to stop and check the authenticity of the website, even if it is a familiar vendor, consider using apps of well-known vendors, check the source of a text, and never click a link - even if it appears to be a genuine source as it will most likely download malware onto your digital device."

The AusPost app is ranked one of the top business apps in Australia1, which is regularly upgraded to support and protect customers.



Recently, a group of volunteers came together for the annual nestmonitoring of Carnaby's black-cockatoo in this district, focussed on Cocanarup Timber Reserve.

This survey has been undertaken for the past 17 years and is organised by Birdlife Australia and the locally based group, **Cocanarup Conservation** Alliance Inc. Dedicated volunteers from various backgrounds and hailing from local and regional areas came together to, in essence, locate previously recorded nest-hollows and check whether the hollows are again occupied or not. They do this by raising a camera (which is wi-fi connected to an iPad) on an extendable pole and thereby gain a view of the hollow.

This year, 247 hollows were

surveyed in the district and 61 breeding attempts were recorded. This is a similar result to recent years and maintains the claim of Cocanarup and surrounds, being one of the most important natural breeding areas for this endangered and iconic species.

Over the 4 day survey period this year, 26 volunteers, including Courtesy BirdLife Australia & CCA

4 Esperance Tjaltjraak Rangers, contributed their time and energy for a total of 300 hours. This is a magnificent effort

but it is also a remarkably rewarding experience for the volunteers.

For several years there has been a concerted effort by **Cocanarup Conservation** Alliance and Birdlife Australia to advocate for the conservation of the Cocanarup Timber Reserve and surrounds to protect the breeding habitat of this species. The data collected by the nest-monitoring over years has been fundamental to establish the critical importance of this area for the future of Carnaby's black-cockatoo.



Great Southern community Spirit, Thursday October 26, 2023 to save with free waterwise offers

Residents of 21 Great Southern communities can now take advantage of free water-saving offers as part of Water Corporation's 2023-24 Waterwise Towns Program, which saved more than three million litres of water across the region last year.

• 21 Great Southern towns eligible for free water-saving offers.

• Water Corporation's Waterwise Towns Program to reach record 47 regional towns.

• Program supports regional households to save water and reduce bills.

• More than three million litres of water saved across the Great Southern last year.

Residents of 21 Great Southern communities can now take advantage of free water-saving offers as part of Water Corporation's 2023-24 Waterwise Towns Program, which saved more than three million litres of water across the region last year.

The annual program, which is available in a record 47 communities State-wide, provides tailored offers to help regional Western Australians reduce water use and lower their bills.

Water Corporation customers in each eligible Great Southern community can now exchange two old, inefficient showerheads for waterwise alternatives under a free Showerhead Swap program.

In addition, residents in each participating town will be able to claim a rebate for the purchase of a new rainwater tank, or to plumb in or replace an existing tank.

Those in Esperance and Albany will also benefit from comparative water use showing how their consumption compares to others.

Since 2013, the Waterwise Towns Program has saved 1.8 billion litres of scheme water State-wide, helping support the long-term security of WA's most valuable resource.


Plumbing and irrigation services are limited, with registrations open until 1 May 2024, unless allocations are exhausted earlier. Showerhead Swap is available until 31 May 2024, while stocks last.

"This is a great opportunity for local residents to take advantage of free waterwise offers that have helped save billions of litres of drinking water across regional communities since 2013," said Water Minister Simone McGurk

"In the Great Southern, the Waterwise Towns program helped save more than three million litres of water last year alone.

"The impacts of climate change are being felt in Southern WA, which is why we all share a responsibility to be as waterwise as possible - every drop counts.

"There are plenty of free water-saving initiatives available for Albany residents, so there's no excuse not to save water,"



said Albany MLA Rebecca Stephens.

GRDC Annual Report 2022-23

GRDC

Often considered the quiet achiever in Australian agriculture, the grains industry notched up another impressive year in 2022-23 with the Australian Bureau of Agriculture Resource Economics and Sciences (ABARES) putting the sector's total value at \$31.1 billion, with wheat earnings alone over \$15.7 billion. These figures overshadow the comparative earnings of the beef sector at \$13.8 billion and wool at \$3.1 billion.

Of course, as an organisation close to our grain grower stakeholders, we are keenly aware these achievements have been helped by two consecutive record-breaking seasons with the 2022-23 crop of 70.8 million tonnes, coming on the back of a 66.5 million tonne crop in 2021-22.

However, we also understand that while favourable seasonal conditions have played a role, longterm strategic RD&E has also been critical to the steadily increasing gains and efficiencies in Australian grain production. Even allowing for seasonal volatility, on-farm grain profits have grown as productivity gains, rather than broadacre expansion, drive grains industry growth across Australia. These gains have been underpinned by strategic and tactical RD&E investments, which have been informed by industry and designed to meet the needs of our key stakeholders - grain growers.

These RD&E investments have been developed in partnership with researchers, universities, government departments and commercial entities and managed by a highly experienced GRDC team.

Transparency of our investments and governance for all of stakeholders is very important for the GRDC team and it is my pleasure to present our 2022-23 Annual Report, which outlines our activities, investments and performance for the last financial year.

We wish our growers a safe and



productive harvest period over the coming months and look forward to continuing to deliver against your RD&E priorities.

Glyphosate is not registered for use as a desiccant on oats

GRDC

This Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) Paddock Practices article was prepared by Grains Australia in collaboration with Grain Producers Australia, GrainGrowers, Grain Trade Australia and the National Working Party on Grain Protection.

Australian oats often attract a premium price because they are sun ripened.

The Australian oat industry is heavily reliant on export markets. To maintain market access, it is critical the Australian grain industry continues to meet regulatory requirements for maximum residue limits (MRLs) both domestically and internationally.

All markets, domestic and international, have strict limits for chemical residues. Marketers closely monitor market requirements and provide advice to growers on their needs. Noncompliance can lead to the rejection of shipments in export markets and create ongoing market access issues.

Key Points:

• Glyphosate is not registered for use as a desiccant on oats

• Use of a chemical on a crop is illegal if it is not registered

• Label directions stipulate the crop type, rate, application timing and withholding periods prior to harvest that must be followed

• Even when complying with label directions, use of a desiccant may lead to



the presence of chemical residues exceeding some market limits

• Speak with your marketer to determine if there are concerns or restrictions on using a particular chemical for a particular crop type

• Industry needs to continue to be mindful of the adequacy of their management system to select stock for shipment to specific markets to meet their MRLs for all commodities and chemicals.

Reminder on compliance with label directions and market requirements

Glyphosate is not registered for use as a crop desiccant on oats. Such use is illegal and will result in detectable residues potentially exceeding domestic and international market MRLs.

Where chemical desiccants are being considered for late season use there is the potential for chemical residues to arise that may exceed certain market requirements even when used in accordance with the label directions.

Given the potential differences in MRLs, exporters may consider the risk of residues arising and exceeding market MRLs as being too high and will not receive grain from crops if treated with certain chemicals.

Oats, other cereals, pulse

and oilseed growers are reminded to adhere to all label directions for herbicides in order to meet their legal obligations of chemical use and to avoid unacceptable chemical residues.

Care should be taken if desiccating crops when adjacent to crops that cannot be desiccated to ensure off-target application does not occur.

As an example, let's consider oats to Taiwan

Australia has a natural competitive edge into most markets because its oats are sun ripened and there are historically low levels of chemical usage and residues arising. The whole industry must work together to ensure this advantage is maintained.

Taiwan is an established market for processed Australian oats. Australia has been supplying Taiwan for about 30 years and holds strong relationships with end-users along with a strong market share.

Taiwan does not have an MRL for glyphosate on specific cereal commodities - barley, oats and sorghum - hence an MRL of zero applies.


The Taiwan Food and Drug Administration (TFDA) maintains a national MRL regulation, listing MRLs that apply to various commodities. The TFDA monitors imported foods, including grain shipments, for pesticide residues.

Taiwan process for notification of MRL violations

As with some other markets, Taiwan's TFDA publishes online the individual results of consignments which have been found to violate their MRLs.

As per their inspection regime regulations, the exporter and/or Australian Government may be required to provide documentation explaining those violations.



More significantly, Taiwan may ask for details of management plans to prevent future violations in consignments.

Depending on the outcome of the review of that documentation, imports may at worst be suspended from Australia.

Bulk handling company and exporter responsibility

Bulk handlers, exporters and processors regularly arrange testing on grower delivery samples during and at the completion of harvest, on post-harvest deliveries and during the storage life of stock on hand.

The Australian Grain Industry Code of Practice for the Management of Grain Within the Australian Supply Chain states (section 2.4.1): 'As required by legislation industry will not trade (i.e., supply) in grain on the domestic or export market that contains a chemical in violation of relevant legislation'.

All marketers and grain traders should implement appropriate management systems to meet market MRLs. This may include the use of Commodity Vendor Declarations (CVD), segregation, sampling and testing prior to outturn, and judicious stock selection. Grain Trade Australia members are required to participate in the National Residue Survey program.

Grower market awareness

Recent results of the National Residue Survey program show a high level of compliance with Australian MRLs, indicating a high level of grower compliance with chemical label directions. Chair of the National Working Party on Grain Protection, Gerard McMullen, advises that all stakeholders have a role to play to ensure the continued good reputation of the Australian grain industry in meeting export market MRLs.

"Growers have a legal obligation to follow label directions and understand the needs of their buyers. Exporters have a role to play also. Grain should not be exported unless the residue status is known and complies with market requirements," he says.

The GRDC fact sheet; Stewardship for pre-harvest application of herbicides in winter crops, is provided to grain producers to make them aware that it is the responsibility of growers and their agronomic advisers to avoid herbicide residues in delivered cereal, pulse and oilseed grains.


